

## Yankees Drop Four; Big Lead Is Pared Down

Connie Mack's Athletics made it three straight over the Yankees with a 5 to 4 score. Ruth and Meusel clouted homers, but Pennock blew up in the eighth inning and the A's pushed three runs across the plate.

Because of Chicago's defeat by Detroit, 14 to 7, however, the Yanks were able to retain their half game hold on first place in the American league. Eddie Collins used five pitchers and two catchers, but the Tigers laced the hurlers' offerings artistically, scoring all their runs in three big innings.

The Washington Senators made a clean sweep of their three-game series with Boston, walking off with ball game by a score of 11 to 0. While Coveleskie was invincible, the Senators were pounding three lowly Red Sox pitchers for 18 hits. Sam Rice, leading the attack with four hits in four times at bat.

The abused Browns stepped on one of their tormentors when they walloped the stuffing out of Cleveland, 11 to 5.

St. Louis staged a wild rally in the ninth, making eight runs on seven hits and three Indian errors, before a man was put out. Sisler's men did all their scoring in the last three innings.

The sensation of the National league—Brooklyn and Chicago, were idle. Pittsburgh beat the cellar occupying Braves, 3 to 2 after an old fashioned pitching duel between Smith and Meadows. The bespectacled Pirate had all the better of the argument. Cuyler's home run settled the issue.

Lucas the transformed pitcher of the Reds, gave another fancy exhibition of mound work and Cincinnati trimmed St. Louis, 6 to 1. The former infielder who was discarded because he couldn't stop the hopping balls, held the Cards to five hits.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 5.—(United News)—Seattle went into first place in the Pacific Coast league standings Wednesday, defeating San Francisco, while Oakland was taking a tight game from Hollywood.

The Los Angeles club was kept inactive by wet grounds in Portland and the Indians' 2 to 1 victory carried them into the lead, a half game ahead of the Angels. Hollywood's 3 to 2 defeat dropped the team to fifth place. Oakland and Mission leading by a fractional margin to tie for third.

By defeating Sacramento, 10 to 4, Mission was able to keep pace with the Oaks and moved with them past the Stars.

Pratt allowed Hollywood but five hits, and Shellenback's feat of limiting the Oaks to seven safeties was overcome by his team mates' four errors. Elliott of Seattle turned back the Seals with six hits, the Indians playing errorless ball behind him.

## NORWAY VAULTER THINKS US QUEER

PASADENA, Cal., May 5.—(United News)—Charley Hoff, world's champion pole vaulter, arrived here Wednesday, and declared he was unable to understand the American attitude of amateur athletes.

The Norwegian athlete was subjected to a great deal of adverse criticism in San Francisco, early in the week, because he would not compete in a meet there.

"I do not understand it all," he declared. "I had no time to train and I was tired. It was a long train ride here from the east."

Hoff is scheduled to appear in a track meet here May 15. Bob Weaver, president of the Southern California Amateur Athletic union, said Hoff would be barred from this meet if the northern California branch of the A. A. U. wishes to make a protest.

## KIDDIES OF CIRCUS SCHOOL ON WHEELS

Singing, drawing, modern writing and physical training are stressed in all grades. Manual training, domestic science and commercial courses are provided for students of higher grade. These volunteer instructors are employees of the show, traveling with it, and so the school bell rings on the road.

## WRITER REFUSES BIG MONEY PRIZE

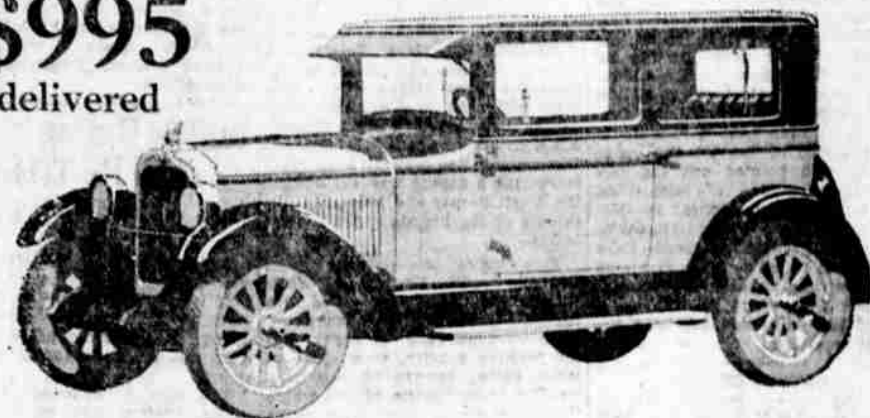
KANSAS CITY, Mo., May 5.—(United News)—"It isn't that I'm too good to take it, and it cost me some struggle to renounce that \$1000 Sinclair Lewis, the author, said here Wednesday in discussing his refusal to accept the Pulitzer prize won by his novel "Arrow-smith" as the best American novel for 1925.

The author said that the names of those who have received the prize in the past—Ernest Poole, Edith Wharton, Willa Cather, Margaret W. Wilson and others—are popular authors for the most part.

"Ah, well," he mused, "what these other prize winners are going to say about it. But God knows it's not that I think I'm too good to take it, but I've been telling these preachers I object to a king in the church and I would be going backward to acknowledge the authority of a king in my own literary church."
