

Oregon's Voice May Reach Ears of Fund Holder

WASHINGTON, May 5.—(United News)—The first public buildings bill since 1913 finished its course through congress Wednesday, when the senate passed the measure providing \$165,000,000 for postoffices and other federal structures throughout the country.

There was no record vote. Congress departed from its old method of handling public building construction in this bill, as allocation of \$150,000,000 of the amount is left to the secretary of the treasury and the postmaster general with no specific projects mentioned in the bill. Formerly congress has specified its projects and such measures have been characterized always as "pork barrel" legislation.

The other \$15,000,000 was authorized in 1913 for construction of some new buildings in sixty-two towns and cities, but had never been appropriated. This construction will now get under way.

Of the \$150,000,000 for new buildings in the District of Columbia, the rest for other parts of the country. No more than \$10,000,000 can be spent annually in the district and not more than \$25,000,000 a year in the rest of the country. The senate placed certain restrictions on the secretary of the treasury in allocating funds for new buildings, amending the bill as it passed the house. In both branches the opposition to the measure was based on the ground that it deprived congress of powers that belonged to it inherently and delegated them to an outside agency.

President Coolidge will sign the bill, as it was an administration measure. Its chief opposition was from democrats.

Klan Rides for Win on Indiana Senate Election

INDIANAPOLIS, May 5.—(United News)—With the Anti-Saloon league and the Ku Klux Klan still in the saddle of Indiana politics the votes of the Hoosier state are content to "let well enough alone." They show little interest in the agitation to modify the Volstead act and have nominated for the United States senate men who are Klan endorsed and very "dry."

These are the two major results of Tuesday's state primary elections. Senators James E. Watson and Arthur Robinson, both backed by the Klan, were re-nominated by the republican party by majorities that may reach 15,000 and 50,000.

Watson was opposed by one candidate and Robinson by a field of four.

The democratic full term senatorial candidate will go into convention, because of the failure of any one of six candidates to secure a majority. Evans Woolen, Indianapolis banker, was unopposed for the short term.

Returns show the return of seven members of the house of representatives who faced opposition. Three other republicans and three democrats were unopposed in the primaries.

All of the nominees for senator and representative in the lower house of congress are decidedly dry and bear the stamp of approval of the Indiana Anti-Saloon league. Wherever the wet issue was injected into the congressional scraps the crusaders for modification failed to secure endorsement of the voters.
