

Guest Athlete 'Lies' Money Is More Important

NEW YORK, May 7.—(United News)—The Amateur Athletic union does not credit Charley Hoff's explanation that he is stale and out of condition, and consequently unable to compete at San Francisco Saturday.

Even the testimony of physicians to the effect that the Norwegian athlete is not in shape to pole vault will not sway the A. A. U. from its determination to cancel Hoff's permit to compete in the United States unless he appears at the Pacific association games Saturday afternoon. Fred W. Rubien, secretary-treasurer of the union, informed the United News Friday night.

"We are trying to protect Hoff, not to dictate to him," said Rubien. "But we cannot permit an athlete to make an agreement to appear at a certain meet and then cancel his agreement at the last moment without good reason."

Hoff's contention is that in advising the A. A. U. he was not in shape, and furnishing medical evidence to that effect, he has fulfilled his promise to let the governing amateur athletic body know it was impossible for him to appear in San Francisco.

Rubien and other officials of the A. A. U., including former President Weaver, who now is head of the Los Angeles club, where Hoff is scheduled to vault next week, are determined not to change their attitude. Hoff must fill his engagement at San Francisco, or the A. A. U. axe will fall.

Farm Relief Is Subject To Deep Opposing Moves

WASHINGTON, May 7.—(United News)—Opponents of the \$350,000,000 farm subsidy proposed in the Haugen farm relief bill are drafting an amendment which they believe will cause enough political complications to show up some insincere politicians, defeat this measure, and save the White House of embarrassment.

This measure, highly complicated in itself, has become so entangled with political complications, that house leaders are totally unable to forecast the outcome.

Despite these puzzling complications it is the largest political question that has come up this year, and deserves far more attention than it is getting. The Haugen bill, sponsored by corn belt republicans, but fought by the administration, proposed a \$350,000,000 subsidy to farmers, and a fee or tax to be levied after two years on farm commodities at the first point of sale.

The theory is that this levy, postponed two years, will appear a far distant thing, and that the

farmer will forget about it during the coming election in his glee over the \$350,000,000 which the government would pay up the surplus during the next two years and thus cause domestic farm prices to rise. There are suggestions that the equalization fee might be repealed before it became effective.
