

RUTH WHALES SIXTH HOMER, TYING RECORD

A last inning rally, which netted a run enabled the Yanks to break the four game losing streak Friday for the Tigers 7 to 6 and kept them on top in the American league.

"Hambo" Ruth poled out his sixth home run, the top number so far this season in either league, and placing him even with his 1921 record.

Splendid pitching by Burleigh Grimes, spitball artist, kept the Brooklyn Robins in front in the National league. Brooklyn won from the Cards 7 to 1. Four St. Louis pitchers paraded to the mound in an effort to stem the Brooklyn onslaught.

The Cubs evened their series with the Giants when Tony Kaufman held the McGraw men to four hits and shut them out, 6 to 0.

Ancient "Habe" Adams, who went into the box for the Pirates in the tenth inning, was credited with an 11 to 10 victory, over the Boston Braves, although Pittsburgh made six errors. Both teams garnered 17 hits in the eleven innings.

The Cincinnati Reds continued to run rampant over the Phillies, winning the second game of the series 6 to 5.

The Athletics took their second straight from the Browns, Grove turning in another fine performance, and the A's three runs in the eighth breaking up his duel with Tom Zachary, former Senator.

Revenge was sweet for the Indians Friday when they manhandled the Red Sox, 11 to 2, avenging Thursday's defeat at the hands of the Hub City nine.

Airtight fielding, plus the strong right arm of Walter Johnson, helped the Senators to continue their winning streak, trimming the White Sox 8 to 2. Harris' gang pounded out 13 hits.

Scandal Persists, Harding Chief Is Indicted for Fund

NEW YORK, May 7.—(United News)—Harry M. Daugherty, attorney general during the Harding administration, is coming to New York to fight the indictment returned by a federal grand jury Friday, on a charge of conspiring to defraud the government in connection with the return of \$6,453,970 in assets of the Metal company to Swiss and German claimants.

Shortly after he was informed of the indictment Daugherty telephoned the United States district attorney's office in New York, and it was subsequently understood that he would surrender voluntarily.

John T. King, former republican national committee man from Connecticut, and Thomas W. Miller, alien property custodian when the alleged illegal transaction was consummated, were indicted on a like charge.

Harding Heads
The indictment charges these three men and the late Jesse W. Smith, Daugherty's aid, were to receive \$391,000 in liberty bonds for arranging the return of the money and asserts that King received that sum in liberty bonds October 1, 1921. King is also charged with accepting a \$50,000 check in July, 1921, in connection with the deal.

The triple indictment is an aftermath of a government scandal which followed indictments returned October 29, 1925, against General Miller, four allies and three foreign corporations growing out of the same deal.

It is expected that the old indictments will be dismissed, although official action has not yet been taken.

Colonel Miller is now on a tour with Colonel G. R. Crossfield, president of Fidae, the international war veterans' organization, but his attorney, former Judge Robert S. Johnston of New York, issued a statement which inferred that Miller was the victim of a conspiracy.

Not Worried

Daugherty was not apprehensive over the indictment. In a statement sent from Columbus, Ohio, he said the case upon which the charge was made was decided nearly five years ago by a division of the department of justice, "regularly authorized to pass upon claims of this character." He disclaimed knowledge of the division's action.

Richard Merton, one of the aliens indicted last fall, is said to have made a full confession before the grand jury, having come here from his home, Frankfurt-am-Main, Germany.

Friday's indictment alleges that Merton came here in 1921 and arranged the transfer of the huge sum with Daugherty, Miller, King and Smith. The indictment says Miller gave Merton two checks totaling

themselves to the utmost to support the officials, who are attempting to act under the emergency powers rule.

In the Air

This is perhaps the first time in the history of the world that a great body of men has had flung at it such a powerful challenge by radio. It constitutes a public ultimatum effective immediately, that disorders in England, Scotland and Wales must cease, or they will be put down by force of might.

Simultaneous with its issuance, police have received new word that they will be held strictly accountable for future outbreaks and further interruptions of traffic.

The government's radio defiance has been supported further by announcement that the number of special policemen guarding London will be increased at once to 50,000, in addition to the regular police force of 20,000 on duty at all times.

Troop movements have been going on for several days, and it is expected in London that the movements of armed forces over the week-end to various danger spots will be the biggest since Tuesday morning.

Paper Cut

The government's war—for it is war insofar as it is a strongly concentrated movement, supported by arms against anti-government forces—has even extended to the official strike order the British Worker, the afternoon edition of that newspaper announced that it had been forced to reduce its eight page tabloid edition to four pages, and that it possibly would not be able to appear at all Saturday.

This was brought about by refusal of the government to allow unionists more print paper, although there is a quantity consigned to the Daily Herald, the labor newspaper, stored on the docks. The newspaper stock is now under police guard, and the government's action means the end of the labor organ.

THANKS FOR BUGGIES

BERLIN, May 7.—Two historic carriages, which were used by the Hohenzollerns for state occasions, have been discovered among a motley store of decrepit vehicles, salvaged by firemen from the burning shack of a Berlin cartwright.

\$6,453,979.97, drawn on the treasurer of the United States, at the Ritz-Carlton hotel, New York, September 30, 1921.

The indictment charges that as a result of the money transfer, "the United States was to be and was defrauded of its aforesaid governmental functions and rights, and of the honest, impartial, unbiased and unprejudiced services" of Miller and Daugherty.

Tornado Rips Up Oklahoma Towns; Ten Are Injured

MUSKOGEE, Okla., May 7.—(United News)—A tornado swept through three Oklahoma counties late Friday, causing injuries to at least ten persons, destroying more than 20 farm homes, toppling telephone and telegraph poles and laid waste hundreds of acres of crops.

Six persons were reported to have been seriously injured at Morris, Okla. An unconfirmed report said that two villages, Beland and Taft, Okla., were completely destroyed by the twister.

The tornado swept over a pathway more than one mile in width, through Muskogee, Okmulgee and Okfuskee counties. A high wind accompanied the rain and hail which swept over Muskogee, but no damage was done here.

Telephone lines to Taft, Boynton and Haskell were destroyed, and late Friday communication with them was impossible.

Near Morris, in Okmulgee county, 20 houses were reduced to wreckage and trees were pulled up by their roots. In Morris one home was caught by a finger of the twister and completely destroyed.

It was not certain late Friday whether anyone was killed but a cursory check failed to reveal any casualties.

The tornado narrowly missed the Morris schoolhouse where 50 children were studying.

British Strike May Spread Into Other Countries

Sympathetic strikes in other sections of the world, urged by communists in various countries since the general strike in Great Britain was called, became more probable as messages from Sweden, Australia and Mexico report that hundreds of thousands of workmen plan to quit their posts unless the English strike is settled soon.

Trade unionists in Copenhagen, Denmark, numbering 302,900 called a walkout for May 21 unless settlement of the English strike came before that date.

Thirty thousand coal miners in New South Wales will strike Saturday because the arbitrational tribunal there reduced wages of skilled workers. Their determination to strike was made stronger by enthusiastic demands of some sections that British labor should be endorsed.

Electrical workers in all sections of Mexico will go on strike for one hour Monday as a demonstration of their sympathy for British workers.

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Back to Home Land Is Malin Rancher's Aim

With money they earned from the rich lands of the Malin country, nine members of the Bohemian colony are leaving Klamath Falls this month for Europe. From New York, where they will join from 70,000 to 80,000 of their countrymen. They will sail for Prague, Czechoslovakia, for a three months' visit.

A. Kalina, banker, theatre owner, merchant and rancher of Malin, will leave Klamath Falls May 23 in his automobile. With him, bound for New York, will be Mrs. Kalina, Steve Kudr and Tony Cacka.

The Kalina party will sail from New York June 9 on the George Washington. Hundreds of countrymen have made reservations on this ship. The party will return late in the fall on the Leviathan.

Modrich failed to land a solid blow during the encounter. Ring-side critics declared him more of a "flop" than Bill Squires, Australian who met with disaster in an American invasion some years ago.

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
