

BUENA VISTA IS BEING IMPROVED BY STREET WORK

Grading is now progressing on Stanford avenue and connecting laterals to California avenue in Buena Vista addition, which will open up a large amount of desirable residence property, according to T. E. Henderson, manager of the Klamath Development company in Klamath Falls. These locations are particularly desirable, from the fact that they afford a splendid view both of Upper Klamath and Ewanna lakes, and of the entire length of Link river.

California avenue, running northwards from the end of Conger avenue, has been considerably developed, all of the land abutting it having been sold to private individuals, and a number of residences erected. A preliminary survey for the purpose of having California avenue paved has been made, and the chances are said to be excellent for its being paved this year.

The land adjoining the length of Stanford avenue is level and very suitable for residence building. In fact, much of Buena Vista is in the nature of a plateau, particularly where the present improvements are taking place. A slope of very reasonable grade connects the plateau with California avenue, and the whole is about a dozen blocks from the court house.

Lots in the newly-developed district in Buena Vista addition will sell from \$250 to \$300 on terms, according to Mr. Henderson, who is of the opinion that there will be a strong demand for the district, particularly in view of the inevitable rapid growth of the city.

Sealed bids are now being asked at the city clerk's office to cover authorized sewer work in the Buena Vista, as well as other additions.

HEAD-LOCK WINS FOR OLD CHAMP

KANSAS CITY, Mo., May 7.—United News—Ed "Strangler" Lewis retained his heavyweight championship crown Thursday night by wrapping his famous headlock around the bullet-shaped head of Mike Romano, the grappler from Southern Italy.

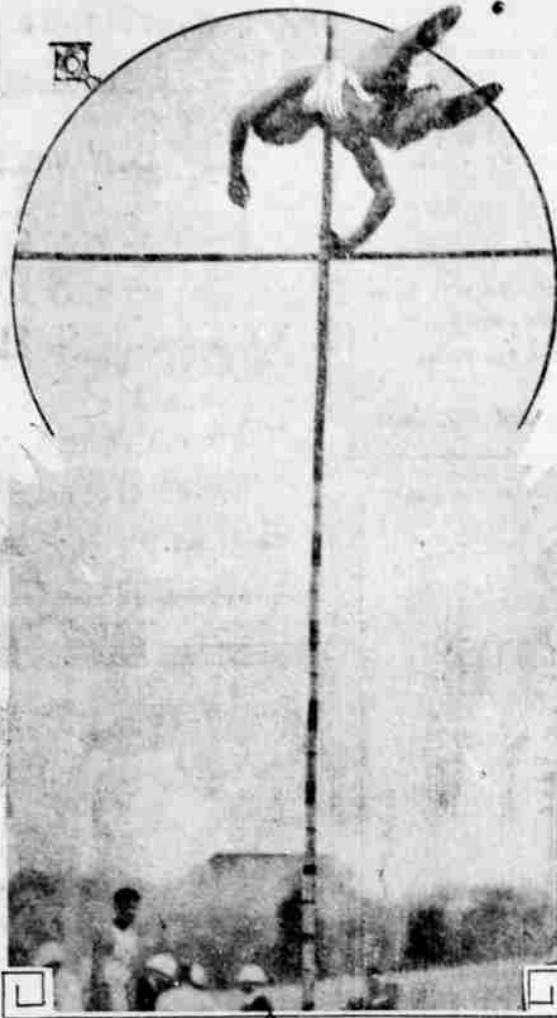

New Addition Is Opened on Sixth By Walton, Wright

Sixth Street addition is the name of the newest addition to Klamath Falls, the plat of which has been approved by the city council and is now on file. Walton and Wright are the realtors who have been in charge of the promotion of the new tract.

Adjoining Mills addition to the south, the new addition is bounded on the west by Sixth street, on the north by Shasta Way, and on the east by Washburn Way. It is about eight acres in extent, and is now staked into lots twenty-five by a hundred feet each, with a twenty-foot alley in each block. The new tract lies directly opposite the site of the Sixth Street Lumber company.

Estimates are being now made of the costs of installing water, telephone, and light facilities, and of completing street work with a rock filling. It is expected that the projected work will be completed, and the addition opened for sale within a few weeks.
