

# Byrd Flew Old Glory Over Pole

## American Is First in Air Track of Peary's Sleds

KINGS BAY, Spitzbergen, May 10.—(United News)—Lieut. Commander Richard E. Byrd, U. S. N., and Floyd Bennett, pilot, swamped with congratulations from all parts of the world following their 15½ hour flight to the north pole Sunday, are planning further conquest of the unknown northlands.

Byrd's trip to the pole Sunday is just the beginning of his exploration work, he said Monday. After two days of rest here the two fliers will start again by plane, this time for unknown places in Norway. The speed of Sunday's flight will not be sought on the next flight. Instead Byrd and Bennett will start out equipped to take their time, and in all probability will disappear from the world as far as news is concerned, for several days on each trip.

### Byrd's Tale

In talks with correspondents Monday Byrd told something of the luck that favored him on his Sunday flight. He had gasoline sufficient for only two or three hours of flying when he returned to Kings Bay from the pole. If he had been forced to land when near the pole he and Bennett might have had serious difficulty in making their return to this base.

Other aviation experts here showed Byrd and Bennett with praise Monday. Captain Helmer-Hansen, who is with the Amundsen-Ellsworth-Nobile expedition, said Byrd's flight was a very fine piece of navigation. He showed himself to be a clever pilot and apparently Bennett was also a capable assistant.

The Aftenpost's Kings Bay correspondent wires that Riser-Larsen, one of the members of the Amundsen-Ellsworth-Nobile expedition, gave out a statement in which he expressed belief that Commander Byrd had reached the north pole. The Danish explorer, Langekoch, told newspaper men at Kings Bay he was skeptical regarding Byrd's claim that he covered 1,500 miles in so short a time.

### Peary and Amundsen

The north pole was discovered in the spring of 1909 by Commander Robert E. Peary of the United States navy, after a painful sledge journey over the ice of the Arctic ocean. Ronald Amundsen, who planned a polar flight in the dirigible Norge from a site alongside Byrd's camp at Kings Bay, is the discoverer of the south pole, a year or so after Peary's trip. Though Byrd's successful flight robs Amundsen of the honor of being the first to fly over the north pole, he may achieve the fame of being the one man to visit both ends of the earth.

## American League Race Tightens, 4 Teams Bunched

NEW YORK, May 10.—(United News)—Another shake-up in the American league, which tossed the Washington Senators from first place down to the bottom of the first division, and what happened to Jess Petty in Chicago were the two features of a busy baseball day.

Petty, the Brooklyn southpaw, who won the first five games he pitched this year, was beaten 9 to 0 by the Chicago Cubs, who now are less than half a game behind the Robins, with the Cincinnati Reds another half game away. One of the weakest defenses in big league baseball let Chicago runs flow across the platter until Jess gave up in despair and was touched for 19 hits, nearly as many as he had allowed all season.

Vic Keen kept the Giants' ten hits scattered and the Cardinals won a ball game, 5 to 4.

Howard Thurston of the White Sox pitched the Senators out of first place and into fourth, shutting out Washington 2 to 0.

Meanwhile, a salvo of home runs from the bats of "murderers' row" was resounding through Yankee stadium, where New York outslugged the Tigers for a 13 to 2 victory. Twenty-nine hits, eight errors and five pitchers marked this game. As Uhlre of Cleveland shut out the Red Sox and the Indians made three runs on three hits off Ebmeke, the Speakerites and the Yankees moved side by side into first place.
