

WOMEN'S CLUB AT CHILOQUIN BUILDS HOUSE

Spacious Structure Is Projected Center of Community

A club building of unusually attractive construction is being planned by the Women's Community club of Chiloquin, according to Ivan A. Smith, supervising architect. The action is being financed by the club through subscription and gifts. Gifts of lumber totaling over \$4000 in value are being made by the Chiloquin Lumber company, the Forest Lumber company, and the Forest Creek Lumber company. The total cost of the building will be \$7500.

Of colonial type, the house will be of frame construction, set off by a large chimney and a rubble stone foundation. Over half of the wall space will be taken up by windows of the Vincent-Whitney type.

Seats 700
An auditorium 40x60 feet in dimensions will be provided for social functions. This will seat about 700. A collapsible stage, as well as seats, can be removed to store-rooms in the basement when not in use. Four fire escapes will lead directly to the ground, through French type doors. A club room of 20x16 feet, opening into the main auditorium by French doors, is equipped with a fireplace of skintiled brick. A conference room of the same size is also provided off the auditorium.

Acoustics
Its acoustics were made the subject of a special study by an engineer from the United States Gypsum company. A ventilating pressure system, actuated by a seven horsepower motor, will change the air every 60 seconds. The roof will be covered with Johns-Manville semi-rigid asbestos slate.

VETS' GUARDIANS DECLARED WASTERS

WASHINGTON, May 12.—(United News)—Nearly eight years after the close of the World war charges of another scandal in connection with veterans of that conflict have been brought here, stirring congress to take steps for remedial legislation. Veterans charge exploitation of mentally incompetent veterans, casualties of nerve wrecking hours in the trenches of France, who number today more than 40,000. While congress is investigating charges that a member of the local governing body, Commissioner Frederick A. Fenning, received excessive fees as guardian of a number of veterans here, reports have come from various parts of the country of similar incidents elsewhere.

Situation Bad
Legislation is aimed at curing the whole situation. Fenning's impeachment is sought in the house, and steps are being taken to that end. While officials of the veterans' bureau have long recognized the need of remedying the guardianship situation throughout the country, and have asked for legislation before, the issue was not brought squarely before congress until airing of the Fenning case. Representative Johnson of South Dakota has a bill which would make Director Frank T. Hines of the veterans' bureau the guardian for mentally incompetent veterans who are beneficiaries of government funds and abolish the system of private guardians. There are over 32,000 guardians at the present time.

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POLAND NOW HAS REVOLT TROUBLE

WARSAW, May 12.—(United News)—Revolution, swift and daring in its execution, suddenly swept over Poland Wednesday, but by nightfall the government claimed to have suppressed the revolt and to have established complete order.

The picturesque warrior, Marshal Joseph Pilsudski, national hero in the fight to gain Polish independence following the world war, led the insurrection, which was directed against the newly formed government of Premier Witos.

Pilsudski's coup was a dramatic one. With the support of his generals he concentrated his troops at Rembertow and began a march upon Warsaw. The government, declaring a state of national defense (equivalent to martial law) countered in drastic fashion.

Hope to Control
At the end of the day the government issued a communique claiming "complete control." The government hoped that the incident was terminated.

Polish insurgents, who started a revolution earlier in the day under the leadership of Marshal Pilsudski, occupied Praga, a suburb of Warsaw, late Wednesday, after the government had claimed to have restored order.

GERMANY SEETHES WITH INSIDE WOE

BERLIN, May 12.—(United News)—The government of Chancellor Luther has fallen, an alleged plot to establish a dictatorship assumes new ramifications, police guard on all public buildings has been reinforced and rumors of an impending coup d'etat are spreading in Germany.

For the first time since inauguration of the Dawes plan restored stability to Germany, the country has reverted to a state of uneasiness, which may hold troublesome possibilities.

Luther's cabinet resigned Wednesday after the reichstag had voted lack of confidence in his government. President von Hindenburg accepted the resignation, but requested Luther to conduct the government provisionally, pending solution of the crisis.

The fall of the cabinet, combined with the police announcement that raids Tuesday night had uncovered a plot to overthrow the government revived rumors that fascist forces were planning a coup d'etat. The government immediately took precautionary measures. Persons in the streets were started to see soldiers carrying field beds to the premises of the chancellor's palace, so that guards might be maintained throughout the night.

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
