

HUGE AIR SHIP SLANTS ROOF OF ROLLING WORLD

Cross the Arctic Sea Into Alaska is Hope of Sky Men

KINGS BAY, Spitzbergen, May 1.—(United News)—The Amundsen-Ellsworth-Nobile expedition, sailing in fair weather, above the roof of the world, is proceeding on its voyage over the north pole and the great polar "blind spot" which is the goal of this year's Arctic expeditions.

The giant dirigible which left Kings Bay at 10 o'clock Tuesday morning under the finest weather conditions was passing over polar ice fields in the afternoon, according to a radio message sent back by Captain Roald Amundsen, leader of the expedition.

Cross World's Roof

He said that his expedition hoped to be at the north pole by midnight, and at Point Barrow, Alaska, by Thursday.

The start of Captain Roald Amundsen, Lincoln Ellsworth and Colonel Umberto Nobile, representing Norway, the United States and Italy—was made under more auspicious circumstances than was that of Lieut. Commander Richard E. Byrd last Saturday.

The dirigible was taken from its hangar for the last, and what was hoped to be the triumphant journey of its trip from Rome shortly after 9:00 o'clock in the morning. The many visitors at Kings Bay and the native populace thronged to the place where the Norge was about to get under way.

The temperature was 27 degrees Fahrenheit.

At 10 o'clock, while the shouts of the hundreds went up and the orchestra from the Norwegian steamship Heimdal played the Norwegian national anthem, the Norge headed northward and disappeared in the unknown Arctic.

Volunteer

Just before the Norge started a member of the dirigible's crew, Omdal, told Amundsen that he was willing to make a parachute jump when the airship arrived over Alaska in an attempt to fasten the mooring rope if the crew should not be able to make a lashing. It was thought unlikely that Amundsen would accept the offer.

As the Norge left, Lieut. Commander Byrd also took off in his airplane and accompanied the airship for a considerable distance, returning to Kings Bay.

is on the Klamath reservation. Of the seven and one-half billion feet originally standing on the reservation, one billion has been cut, two and one-half billion feet is under contract and four billion is yet to be sold. Indians have realized \$4,000,000 from timber sales, some of which has been disbursed by the Indian service.

Cuts Set

Arnold told of procedure in selling reservation timber units, pointing out the fact that a minimum and maximum cut was prescribed for each unit, and explaining the 12 1/2 per cent increase in cost of the timber on reservation units, every three years.

Of the 400 million feet cut last year, 205 million feet came from the reservation. "You will be interested to know that 23 per cent of the standing timber in the Klamath basin is on the reservation, 20 per cent on national forest lands and 43 per cent owned by ten large timber owners who as yet have not started to cut their stumpage. So from those figures you can see that this country is bound to be one of the outstanding lumber producing sections in the United States."

Not Too Fast

The Indian service has taken the position that reservation timber resources should not be liquidated too rapidly. The figures I have given on lumber production during 1925, were gathered in connection with a survey made by me and other service officials to determine a policy of selling units.

Grazing

The Indian reservation plays a prominent part in the Klamath livestock industry. I understand there are 80,000 head of sheep in Klamath. Of that number 34,000 were grazed on reservation land last year. Receipts from grazing fees were \$25,000, which is given to the Indians.

From timber sales, Indians have realized \$4,000,000. Part of this money has been disbursed to the Indians, part has been used to defray expenses for maintenance on the reservation and still another part is held to the credit of the Indians by the Indian service.

Hotel for Men Is Under Way Near Station

The Ora M. Young Hotel for men is being erected at the corner of Market and Oak streets, a block from the Southern Pacific station, according to supervising architect Ivan A. Smith. Work commenced yesterday morning on a section of 28 rooms, and a second section of equal size will be started within 10 days if pending negotiations are completed by that time. The new hotel will be for men only, will be two stories in height, and when completed will cost in the neighborhood of \$41,000, for the first section when furnished.

Insulation

Complete insulation against heat and cold will be provided by Rock hollow brick wall construction. This construction has been approved by the American Bureau of Standards and has been used by the American Institute of Architects for the last 17 months. An automatic oil heater will be installed. Ventilation will be assured through the sending of a fresh current to each room and withdrawing the old air by mechanical means. Each room will have a recessed basin lavatory and large clothes closet. Public baths will be equipped with showers. Floors will be of the Roddia recessed type, giving the effect of a smooth and flush hall wall surface.

The first unit will contain a large and comfortable lobby, and the second unit a kitchen, and a dining room seating 300 people. An ice plant will be installed in the basement.

Plenty Work

Construction is rushing, according to Mr. Smith, who has wired to San Francisco for another draughtsman. Work enough to keep the firm busy until September is now engaged for, he said. Mr. Smith is in direct supervision of the work on the new hotel, as well as other building projects.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 12.—After winning nine straight games, Dixie Elliott of Seattle, pitched his first losing contest of the season Wednesday. Los Angeles climbed on Elliott's offerings for ten hits, which, coupled with the three Indian errors, resulted in a 4 to 1 Angel win.

By their victory the Angels gained a clean title to first place in the league standings. Oakland dropped out of its tie after suffering a 7 to 4 defeat at the hands of Mission.
