

FIGHT ON DOGS IN SCHOOL USE OUSTS SCIENCE

Medical College Has Pound Supply Cut by Society

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., May 13.—(United News)—Science or no science the humane society here don't intend to permit any more Oklahoma City dogs to be used for vivisection by the medical students of the University of Oklahoma.

If the worst comes to the worst, the society may make a political issue of the impaling of dogs at the next municipal election.

Perhaps it was because they sensed this possibility that the city commissioners Thursday afternoon postponed the case until next Tuesday for the purpose (as they said) of "investigating the situation."

Anyway an indignant group of members of the humane situation, aroused to a fighting pitch by an advertisement by the University of Oklahoma medical college, asking for dogs for vivisection, appeared at the regular city commission meeting Thursday and demanded that the "cruelty to animals be prohibited."

Dog Supply
It all started last Thursday when the commission voted to furnish dogs from the city pound. It meant the knife for any Fido without a home, and a tax on his collar.

At once the humane society dug up an old statute which said that no experiments upon any living creature shall be permitted in any public school, within the state of Oklahoma.

Dr. Alma Neill of the university medical faculty rushed forward with the declaration that Oklahoma cannot have a medical school with an "A" rating without the use of animals for experimental and vivisectional purposes.

This is too bad, the friends of the dog replied, but nothing could be done about it. It was even intimated that cruelty to frogs, turtles, rabbits, guinea pigs, rats and cats would be prohibited.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., May 13.—(United News)—Kentucky magic, spun of the gossamer of thoroughbred lore and the mellowness of blue grass tradition, once more is luring its ever-willing victims from all corners of the land.

What event save the Kentucky derby could bring to this smoky old city on the banks of the gleaming Ohio, the mayor of New York, the president of the Frisco railroad, a film star from Hollywood, a diplomat from Mexico, 200 members of the aristocratic junior league, and "One-Eye" Connelly, the gate crasher?

All Here

All these and 50,000 more, sportsmen, society women, tourists and gamblers, are here on their way, all thrilling with the same eagerness for that breath-taking moment when the barrier is sprung and a dozen equine champions leap away in wild flight in quest of America's greatest turf prize.

The intersectional rivalry in the Kentucky derby is always great. Horsemen of the blue grass state are jealous of the reputation and the prowess of home-breds. Easterners who have come in greater numbers this year than ever before want to see a New York colt take the race away with the \$50,000 stake and immortal glory.

This year the east has the edge. W. R. Coe's Pompey, the champion two-year-old of 1925, flitted around the oval at Churchill Downs in 1:39 2-5, finishing the mile with the boy straining with all his might to hold the colt back.

Pompey Favored

As a result of this performance Pompey, the great, now stands alone as a first favorite among the field of a dozen or more thoroughbreds which will parade to the barrier on Saturday.

The latest odds on Thursday were 13 to 5 against the New York horse. The hearts and dollars of Kentucky will go on the gentle brown nose of Colonel E. R. Bradley's Bubbling Over, nevertheless. This home-bred flyer's final derby trial
