

# PELICANS START SEASON WINNING SLUGGING GAME

## Grants Pass Men Taken In Camp by Locals' Strong Finish

The Klamath Pelicans opened the Southern Oregon league schedule at the fair grounds Sunday with a 15 to 8 victory over the Grants Pass Cave Men.

The game was replete with thrills, and the score does not really do justice to the scrappy, hard hitting visiting team which grabbed a four-run lead over Klamath in the fourth inning, by plastering out four straight hits off "Red" Saunders, who opened up in the box for the Pelicans. Street, Klamath's old reliable twirler, was rushed into the breach, but the Mallin ace was only able to hold the visitors by keeping the hits well scattered.

### Good Infield

The Pelican infield to a man played glib-edged ball, and offered exceptional support to the hard-hit pitchers. DuBack at short, pulled two timely thrillers, when he caught batters asleep off the second sack with the old hidden ball stunt. One victim of DuBack's cunning was old Hub Pernoll, center fielder for the Cave Men, who boasts a record of four or five seasons in the coast league, and one in big time company with Detroit.

At first base Aiken played a mighty good game, handling 12 chances without a bobble. Brady Montgomery at second, showed the fans that he has the stuff, and pulled a sensational catch or two, and otherwise conducted himself in big league style. "Frenchie" Bayness at third, played one of the best games ever seen on the local lot. King caught a steady, high class game, and poled out a timely home run.

### Plenty Power

The Klamath outfield looked like a first class bet with Fuller and Matty Mathews transplanted into center and right field late in the game.

Taking it all in all the fans got their money's worth, with plenty of thrills and volleys of hard hitting by both clubs.

A special feature of the game was a foot race between Ott Lorenz and Bert Cook, which was staged just before the players took the field. Lorenz beat Cook out by about one length, amid the howls of the fans.

but a snake dance, and the climax ought to have been reserved for the final chapter.

Democrats appear to be regaining their courage and their attack is likely to develop rapidly now. They have been thoroughly demoralized all winter and most of them have trailed with the administration on the important measures such as tax reduction and debt funding.

But there is a strong feeling among democratic senators that the administration is going to lose in the Pennsylvania primaries Tuesday. If Pepper is defeated this will set off the opposition in full cry.

### Surface Scratched

Borah, wearing warpaint and full regalia for the first time in weeks, attacked the administration of alien property funds and hinted that conditions indicated in the indictment of former Attorney General Harry M. Daugherty and others, hardly scratched the surface.

"There can be no possible doubt," Borah asserted, "that there have been millions and millions squandered. Some have been embezzled and stolen. We have only scratched the surface with reference to exposing the intolerable methods of handling this property."

He showed the senate 32 1/2 pages of fine type, which he said was a list of lawyers hired as attorneys by the alien property administration.

The New York Yanks increased their lead in the American league by a full game over Washington, while the Cincinnati Reds skidded and barely clung to their newly acquired leadership in the National league Monday.

Continuing their advance upon the leaders, the Pittsburgh Pirates and the Philadelphia Athletics both gained as a result of victories. Tris Speaker's Indians, who recently tumbled out of the first division, climbed back in by administering a 12 to 5 defeat to the Washington Senators. Cleveland made 19 hits in this game.

The Yanks were outbitt by the White Sox, but won out 5 to 3, while the Athletics, with old Bob Quinn pitching sterling ball, beat Detroit, 5 to 1.

For several extra innings in Pittsburgh it looked as though the Robins might regain first place in their league, but the world's champions finally downed Uncle Robbie's men, 7 to 6, in 12 frames. The Reds lost to the Giants 7 to 4, but retained the lead, while the Cubs, by winning from the Phillies 7 to 6, moved up into a tie for second place.
