

RUTH SLUGS TWO TALL HOMERS TO SET NEW RECORD

Famous Hitter Goes Ahead of Mark in Year He Was Champion

Driving out two tremendous home runs, which brought his total for the season to 14, Babe Ruth furnished the sensation of Wednesday afternoon's big league baseball, while the Yankees, by virtue of his hits, beat the Browns 6 to 2.

The big slugger now is two home runs ahead of his record to May 19, 1921, the year in which he compiled his record, and is confident that he will be able to drive out 50 or more homers this season.

"May be I can make it, even if the ball is dead," said the Babe, all smiles, as he trotted in after his second blow into the right field bleachers in the eighth inning at Yankee stadium.

Senators Drop
The Yanks gained a full game over the Senators, who lost to Detroit, 6 to 9, and dropped into third place. Tris Speaker's Indians came from behind at Philadelphia, getting five runs in the last few innings and defeating the Athletics 6 to 5.

The White Sox, by beating the Red Sox in a free hitting game, 9 to 7, climbed up closer to the first division, while Boston is crowding St. Louis for last place.

The Cincinnati Reds proved themselves worthy occupants of first place in the National league when they hit consistently behind Pete Donohue and beat the Brooklyn Robins 5 to 1. Donohue allowed but two hits.

The Chicago Cubs lost a chance to take second place when they lost to the Braves 5 to 2. Pittsburgh's world's champion took another fall out of the Giants 6 to 3, and strengthened their hold on a berth in the first division.

New York State Will Take Vote On Prohi Laws

ALBANY, N. Y., May 19.—New York state, with a population larger than that of any other commonwealth in the union, is to have an official popular referendum on prohibition. The voters of the state will ballot at the November elections on the question of modifying the Volstead act to permit the manufacture and sale of light wines and beer, as a result of Governor Al Smith's approval late Wednesday of the Kart-Phelps referendum bill, which previously passed the assembly and senate.

The referendum will not change the law in any respect, serving only as an expression of opinion by the voters of the state.

Communication Is Giant Among Firm Ranks in Country

NEW YORK, May 19.—(United News)—The American Telephone and Telegraph company is to be the first American corporation with a billion dollars of capital stock outstanding.

Additional stock totaling \$154,000,000 to pay the costs of new construction will be issued, the directors have announced. This will be offered to stockholders of record June 9 on the basis of one share for each six shares now owned. Some 370,000 stockholders will be entitled to the new issue. When it has been sold the American Telephone and Telegraph company will have \$1,077,000,000 of capital stock publicly owned, the greatest investment ownership of history. The United States steel corporation must take second place with a stock total of \$868,583,600.

The new issue is part of an authorized capital increase from \$1,000,000,000 to \$1,700,000,000 voted a year ago last March.

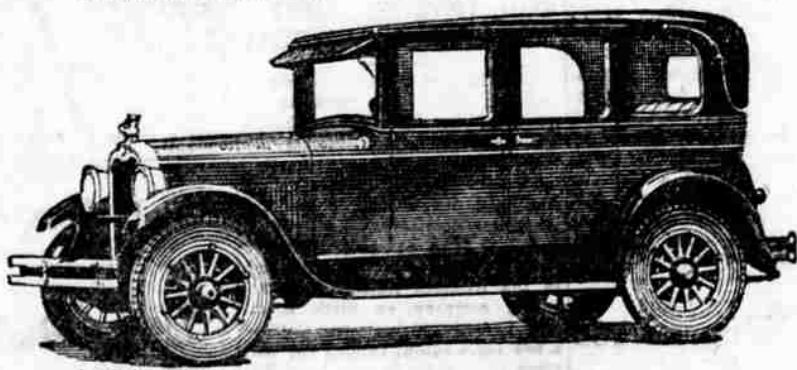
