

RUTH AND YANKS TURN AMERICAN LOOP FANS WILD

Home Runs and Straight Wins for Team is Dynamite

Leaders in both big leagues further strengthened their hold on the top rungs in Thursday's games.

With Babe Ruth collecting his 15th homer, and Pat Collins driving out his fourth circuit drive, the Yanks drove in four runs in the big fifth and finished with a 5 to 4 win over the St. Louis Browns. This made the ninth straight win for the Yanks and gives a wide lead in the American league.

In the National league, the Cincinnati Reds further entrenched themselves in the lead by walloping the Brooklyn Robins 7 to 2.

Hammering out 18 hits off four opposing pitchers, the White Sox easily defeated the Red Sox 13 to 4. Earl Sheeley, White Sox first baseman, collected three doubles.

The Athletics evened up the series with Cleveland, when they won 10 to 2. The Indian pitchers Uble, Karr and Norman Lehr, recruit, allowed 11 hits.

The Indians continue to maintain their hold on second place by virtue of Detroit's 6 to 5 win over Washington.

The Giants, consistent losers for the past few weeks finally broke the jinx that has been pursuing them, and barely defeated the Pirates, 5 to 4. Failure of the Pirates to put across a double steal in the ninth which would have resulted in a score, lost the game.

The Cubs beat the Boston Braves 8 to 4, usurping Brooklyn's hold on second place.

Taking advantage of a few well placed hits, the St. Louis Cards triumphed over the Phillies 4 to 1.
