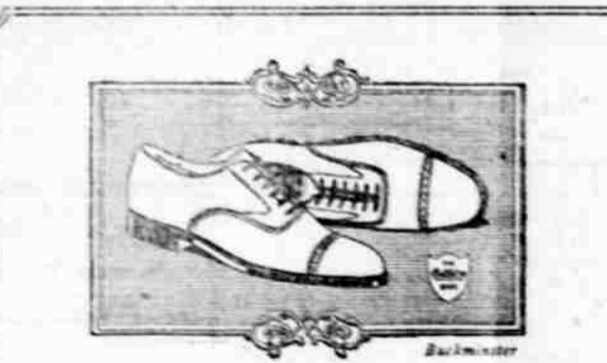
**Boy from Bonanza**—William No-torney of Bonanza was in yesterday from his home in the neighboring city.
