

FANS THANK VET HURLER FOR HIS YEARS OF LABOR

Alexander, Chicago Star, on
Receiving End First
Time in Career

CHICAGO, May 21.—(United News)—Grover Cleveland Alexander, the old warhorse of the Cubs hurling corps, Saturday afternoon will find himself on the receiving end for the first time in his major league career.

When "Pete," as the lanky Nebraskan is affectionately known among the home folks, steps on the rubber to hurl the first ball against the Braves, he will find an expensive automobile barring the throw. The car, a gift of the fans will be given to him as a token of appreciation for 14 years service he has given to organized baseball.

In the 14 years he has been in the big top Alex has drawn his salary check from only two teams—the Phillies and the Cubs. He has only once tasted the fruits of a world's series, his club for the most part being second division entries. But he is rated as one of the greatest pitchers the game knows.

Alexander became a star while pitching with Philadelphia, back in 1913 and the baseball world was staggered when Alex and his battery mate, Bill Killefer, were sold to the Cubs at the then highest price ever paid in a ball player deal. Alex and Killefer were rated as the greatest battery the big leagues ever saw in action. Killefer later became manager of the Cubs and now is with the Cards as coach.

Known as the fastest worker in both leagues Alex seldom needs more than 90 minutes to finish a game. His stalwart right arm has lost some of its cunning and he leans heavily on his fielders, where his dazzling speed once published batmen "Pete" now has to rely on his grey matter and a few lucky breaks.
