

DEMPSEY RISKS DOUBLE DANGER IN SPEED TOWN

Jail If He Does, Jail If He Does Not, Call at Madera

MADERA, Calif., May 24.—(United News)—Jack Dempsey has an engagement here Tuesday, but apparently the heavyweight champion isn't letting the affair disturb himself greatly.

Scheduled to appear before Justice L. M. Bailey to answer a charge that his automobile was speeding on the highways at some sixty or seventy miles an hour, Dempsey will be on the other side of the continent—allowing the law to take its course.

Justice Bailey has promised that Dempsey's failure to appear will result in the issuance of a bench warrant for his arrest.

Told of press dispatches from Hendersonville, N. C., which indicated that Dempsey had no intention of appearing in Madera on his trial date, the judge reiterated his statement that the champion's arrest will be sought.

"No request for a postponement has come to my attention," he said, "and the usual procedure in such cases will be followed. If Dempsey doesn't appear voluntarily we will take steps to bring him here."

The St. Louis Cardinals, using six pitchers, came from behind to beat the Reds 11 to 6. St. Louis, trailing 6 to 0 in the sixth, made all its runs in the last three innings at bat, scoring seven times in the eighth. Rixey and Mays were the victims.

RACING AUTOS TUNE ENGINES FOR BIG MEET

Five Hundred Mile Classic Brings World's Fastest Cars to Indiana

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., May 24.—(United News)—A week before the big event, racing cars are hurrying around the Indianapolis speedway in preparation for the 500-mile race here Memorial day.

Harry Hartz, Pete de Palo, Ralph de Palma, Bennett Hill and numerous other widely known track stars are among the 38 entries who are tuning up their speedy racers.

In order to qualify each entry must make an average of 85 miles an hour for ten miles.

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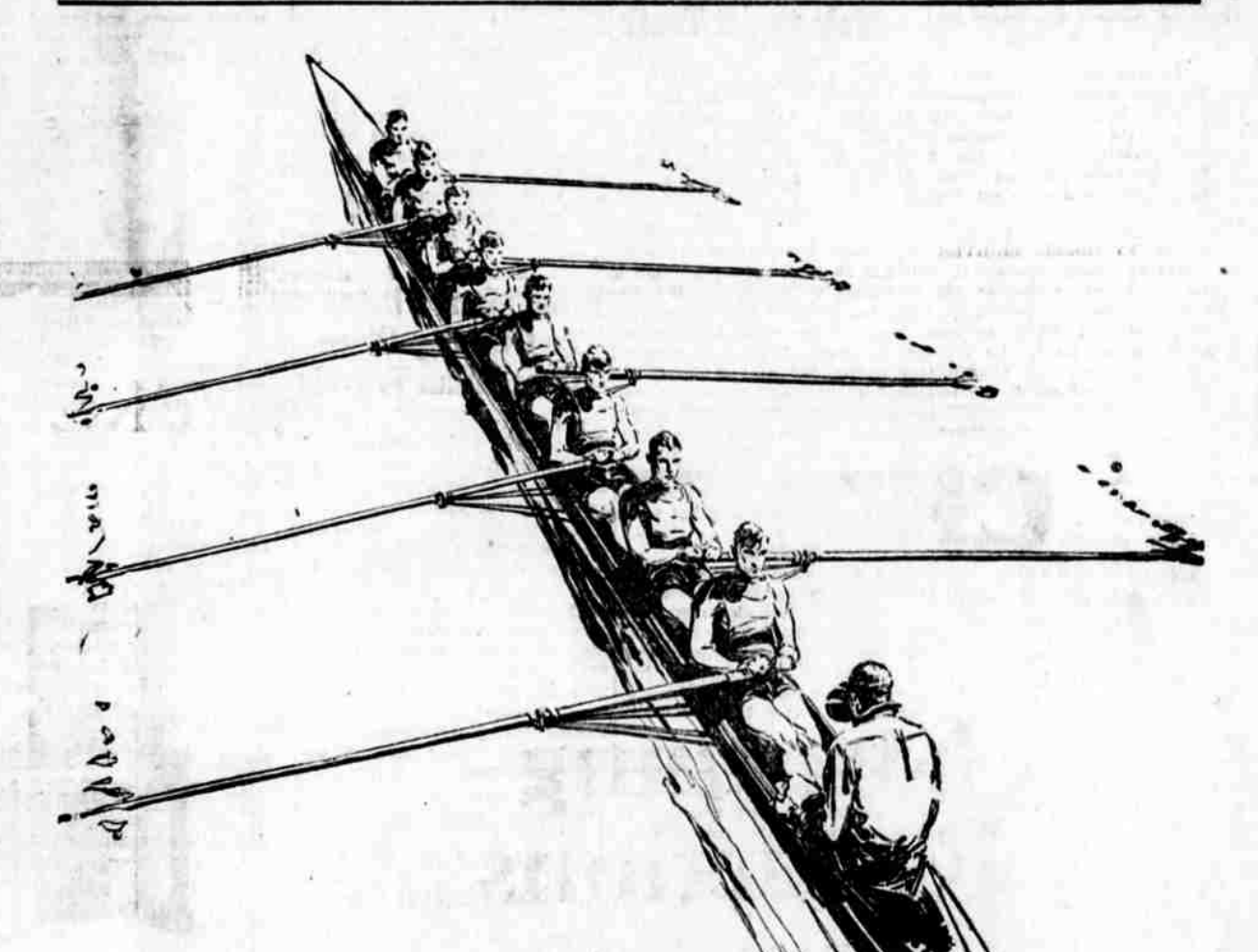
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
