

WINNING RUN OF YANKS UP TO SIXTEEN

Team Far Out in Front in American League Procession

Facing the crucial test of their sensational winning streak, the Yankees are returning home to fight, having won more games in succession than any team which ever represented New York in the American league.

When Miller Huggins' men got the last red-hot Bostonian out in the ninth after an up-and-down, free hitting game at Fenway park Wednesday, they had won their 16th straight contest, and were within three games of the league record. The score was 9 to 8.

The Yanks will encounter stiffer opposition in New York than at any time since they started their winning streak, for they meet the Philadelphia Athletics in a three-game series.

Big Lead

Extending their winning streak to 16 consecutive games Wednesday by hammering five Boston pitchers the New York Yanks now lead the American league with a margin of eight and one-half games over the Cleveland Indians, who are in second place.

Meanwhile, the Cincinnati Reds seem to have lost the drive which carried them into first place in the National league. As a result of their 8 to 5 defeat in St. Louis, Hendrick's club retains their lead by less than a full game over the Cubs.

The game at Fenway park, in which the Yanks approached closer to the American league record of 19 consecutive victories, was a free hitting affair, "murderers' row" making 14 safeties. Sam Jones worked well for the winners until the sixth, when Braxton relieved him in the midst of a Boston rally, the Yanks finally winning out, 9 to 8.

Athletics Up

The Athletics replaced the Senators in third place, by defeating the 1925 pennant winners, 3 to 1. Cleveland, lost to Detroit 7 to 6, when Karr was knocked out of the box in the sixth.

The Giants again took a fall out of Brooklyn and pulled the Robins, who were leading the league a short time ago, out of the first division.

St. Louis' seven-run rally in the eighth against Cincinnati advanced Rogers Hornsby's crew into the place held yesterday by Brooklyn.

New York's victory came at the end of a loosely played game, 5-3. The Phillies walloped the Braves 13 to 7. Welch, J. Wilson and Harper contributing home runs.

The hitting on Wednesday was the heaviest of the season, averaging over 23 hits per game.

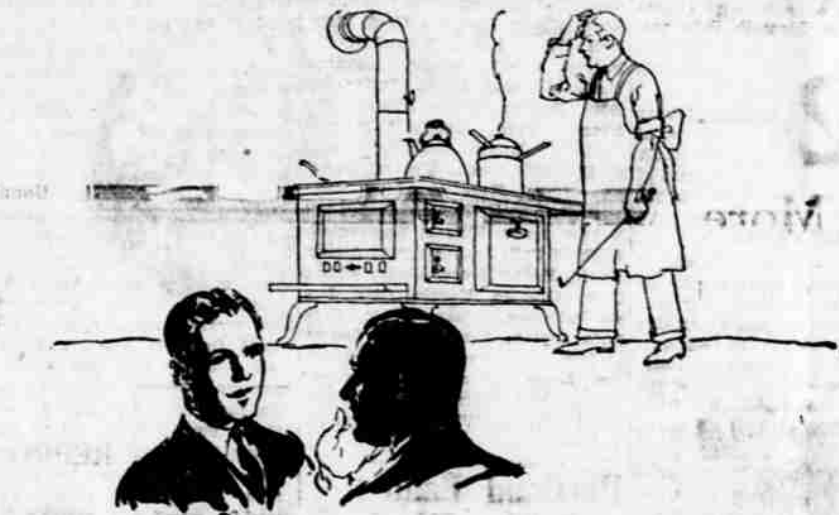

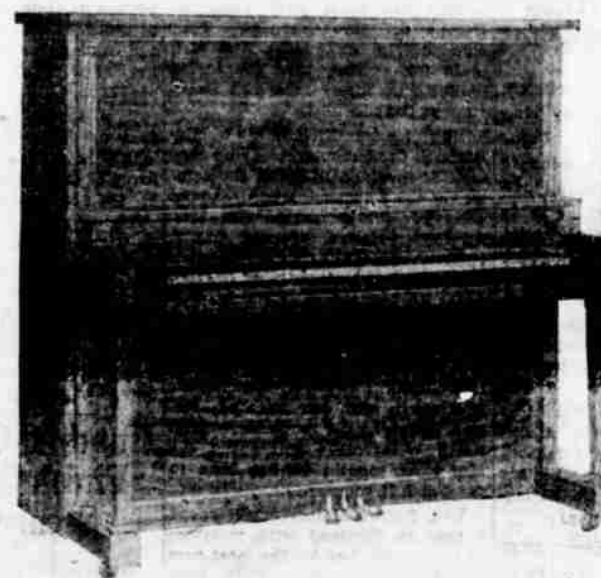
