

ATHLETIC JINX CHECKS STREAM OF YANKS WINS

New York Fails of Making Record of Straight Run Victories

YANKEE STADIUM, New York, May 28.—(United News)—Lefty Groves and the Philadelphia Athletics put a sudden and emphatic ending to New York's winning streak by winning a double header at Yankee stadium. Groves did the stopping in the first game, his pitching halting the Yanks with a record of 16 consecutive victories. The score was 2 to 1.

Then to make it clear that the Yanks were really and truly stopped the Athletics fell upon Urban Shocker like a ton of bricks in the second game and walked away with the nightcap, 6 to 5.

Tough Ones

They were two tough games for New York to lose and a crowd of some 35,000 groaned to see their favorites thus turned back after 16 straight wins.

The visitors' first run in the opening game followed Koenig's error, French's single and Gallo-way's infield out in the second inning. The other tally was when French's triple scored Dykes in the fourth.

It was the seventh before New York squeezed a run, and then it was only an unexpectedly wild heave by Cochrane, who was trying for a double play, which let Adams score. Here is what happened to the averages:
