

RICH INDIAN WANTS TO BE FREE OF WIFE

**White Woman and Native
of Great Age Have
Wedded Break Down**

LOS ANGELES, May 28.—(United News)—Jackson Barnett, wrinkled old Creek Indian, who has earned more than a million dollars from oil royalties, wants to rid himself of the white cave woman who six years ago, married him against his will.

In an annulment action filed here Friday by his legal guardian Barnett also asks that his wife be compelled to account for more than a million dollars, transferred from his estate.

Barnett specifically charges that Anna Laura Lowe Barnett hung about his Henriette, Okla., reservation tent one fine day in 1920 and cast love sick eyes at him.

She Sticks

He asked her to go away, according to the petition on file, but the young woman persisted in her friendship. Finally, it is alleged, she abducted him when she was prevented by the federal agents from securing a marriage license to wed him.

He was pulled off to Coffeyville, Kansas, and before he knew what it was all about, Barnett says, he was married.

At the time of his marriage Barnett was legally "incompetent" and unable to marry by order of the Oklahoma courts.

The action asks that the marriage be annulled on the grounds the ceremony was illegal and petitions that the wife be enjoined from spending any of the funds of the estate.

CHURCH FIGHT ON MODERNS DROPPED

WASHINGTON, May 28.—(United News)—Ultra fundamentalists practically dropped their fight Friday against modernists in the present Northern Baptist convention.

They made a last stand in an effort to "purge" the foreign missionary board, which they claim is dominated by modernists, but were overwhelmingly defeated, their separate ticket for this board being voted down 1708 to 481.

Previously they consented to the election of Dr. J. Whitcomb Brougher, of Oakland, Calif., leader of the middle-of-the-road group, and agreed to the slates for the various boards, with the exception of the foreign missionary board. They dropped their opposition to the slates supported by the modernists despite a decision made Thursday night at a mass meeting to run a full separate ticket.

It was generally believed after their failure to defeat the foreign mission slate that they also would drop the various resolutions aimed at a further show-down with the modernists, including a declaration against evolution, about which was expected to center one of the warmest fights of the convention.

The ultra-fundamentalist group has acted contrary to expectations in some cases, however, and its leaders may call up the resolutions Saturday, when they will be received.
