

Jess Sweetser, U. S. Entry, Wins English Amateur Golf Title

Modest Player Easily Takes Measure of Scotch Survivor of Early Contest; Given Wonderful Ovation With Few Americans in Gallery.

MUIRFIELD, Scotland, May 29.—(United Press)—A quiet, smiling American, playing as coolly as though in a club tournament at home, today won for America her first British amateur golf championship in 22 years.

Jess Sweetser, the 27-year-old bond broker of New York, nudged his ball into the hole on the 31st green for a short, easy putt and ended six up and five to play, in the international match in which he had demonstrated throughout his superiority over A. F. Simpson of Edinburg, the British runner up.

With true sportsmanship, the big gallery, in which there was only a sprinkling of Americans, gave the "bonnie young chappie" a wonderful ovation.

Carried Away
Bobby Jones, Francis Ouimet, Jesse Guifford and other Americans surged around and in a moment Sweetser was hoisted on their shoulders. Surrounded by a cheering crowd, he was borne in triumph to the clubhouse, wobbling in his perilous seat like a man astride a camel, his cap pushed far over on one ear, and struggling to keep upright.

Sweetser's modesty made a tremendous hit with the Scots and British, and a general feeling prevailed that if a native could not win the title, a better substitute than Sweetser could not have been picked.

Takes Huge Cup
At the clubhouse ceremonies in which Sweetser was handed the huge cup, Sweetser seemed actually embarrassed. He looked almost on the point of tears when the American Olympic yell was given him, but rallied during the presentation speech and made a graceful acceptance of the cup. The trophy will remain in the clubhouse here and Sweetser will take home a medal commemorative of his victory and "proprietorship" of the cup for a year.

Sweetser is the first native American ever to win the British amateur championship. Walter J. Travis, who won in 1904, although an American, was born in Australia.
