

STARKEY TAMES WILDCAT EVASCO

Cash customers at the Scandia hall arena last night got a real run for their money in the Starkey-Evasco main event, which went to the Chico mauler by the technical knockout route in the ninth round of a scheduled ten-round go.

In the third, fifth, eighth and ninth rounds Starkey had the game little Philippine boy groggy, but was unable to set himself for the sleep producing wallop in the earlier rounds. In the ninth Referee Bobby Ross saved the Sacramento boy, who struggled to his feet at the count of nine, after having been practically knocked through the ropes, by raising Starkey's glove and ending the slaughter.

Evasco proved to be fast and willing, but was unable to solve Starkey's guard and apparently did not carry a dangerous wallop.

In the six-round semi-final event Jack Crim of Chiloquin knocked out Earl Stolz of Bend in the fourth round. Crim appeared to be the cleverest fighter, although he took some punishing blows from Stolz. The blow that ended the quarrel took Stolz in the mid-riff and sent the Bend boy groveling to the carpet.

The Jimmy Harms-Sidney Dean four-round preliminary was a rather sorry exhibition. The bell saved Dean in the first round, but in the second he took the count.

The curtain raiser between Link Linkenback and Shine Parker ended in the same manner as the fight staged by these two boys at the last Scandia card three weeks ago. Linkenback finally clouted the colored lad in the second round until he collapsed in his corner of the ring.
