CORONACH WINS IN GREATEST RACING CLASSIC

King George's Jockey Rides
Winner to Victory Midst
Storm Applause

EPSOM DOWNS, England, June 2.—(United News)—While his 11-year-old white whiskered owner, Lord Woolavington, sat comfortably at home in Berkeley square, awaiting the news, and some half million others stood dripping uncomfortably in a terrific downpour which drenched the downs and turned the track into a quagmire, Coronach, sturdy brown son of Harry-On Wet Kise, splashed to victory in the 127th renewal of the derby, greatest of racing classics, Wednesday.

Caked with mud so thick that the colors were practically indistinguishable, the rest of the field, including the heavily backed favorite, followed, five lengths behind.

The nearest was Lance Gave, an outsider, owned by W. Singer, a former American, now naturalized, which finished a short head in front of the Earl of Derby's Colorado, the 2 to 1 favorite, backed to the extent of some \$12,000,000.
