

### Fire Department Busy in Putting Out Grass Fires

Four fires sweeping over dry grass areas in Klamath Falls yesterday called on the fire department, and at one time caused both engines to answer simultaneous calls. There was practically no damage, according to a statement of firemen last night.

The first call came in at 1 p. m., when several acres of grass in the Hot Springs section near Wall and Esplanade streets caught fire. Firemen worked quickly to quench the flames which might have reached the unfinished court house building or the county library.

While firemen on engine No. 1 answered a call to put out a grass fire on California avenue through to High street at 4:10 p. m., another call brought out engine No. 2 to Third and Roosevelt streets.

At 8 o'clock last night the fourth call was answered. Grass growing on the canal bank on the corner of Eleventh and Lincoln streets had caught fire, presumably from a carelessly thrown cigarette. Considerable damage might have resulted had the fire gone beyond control, as the home of Joe Pospisil is located but 10 feet from the bank. The fence of the Pospisil property was burning when the fire department arrived.
