CRUELTY CHARGED IN DIVORCE COMPLAINT

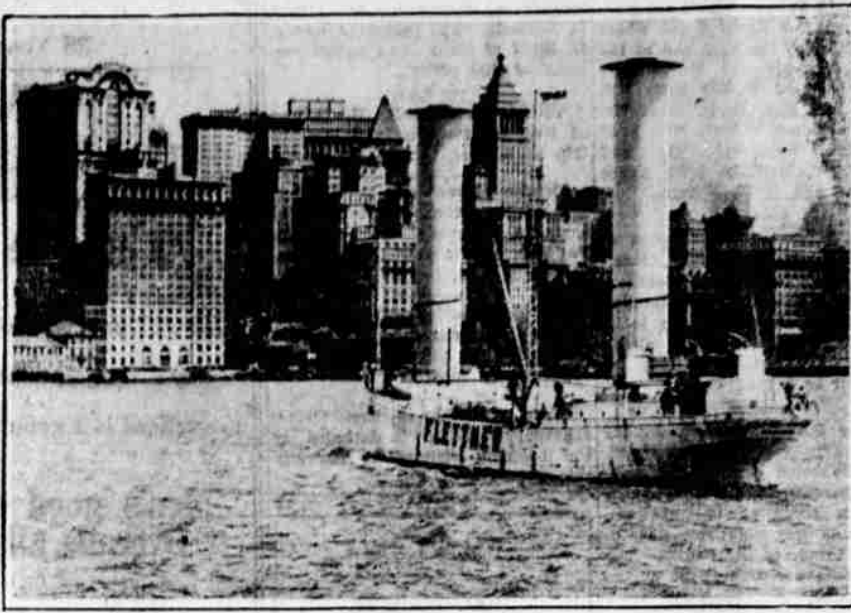
