STATE CONVENTION OF BUSINESS WOMEN WILL BE HELD IN ASTORIA

Business as well as social activities combine to make up a very busy program as planned for the sixth annual convention of the Oregon Federation of Business & Professional Women's clubs, to be held at Astoria, June 18, 19, 20. The convention proper opens Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock with the state president, Mrs. Louise Hacker Turner presiding. Miss Cecelia M. Beyer, president of the Astoria club, will bring greetings of welcome from her club to the assembled delegates, members and guests. The afternoon will be devoted to addresses and reports from the following state officers: Mrs. Louise Hacker Turner, recording secretary; Miss Martha M. Gasch, corresponding secretary; Miss Martha O. Goldapp, treasurer; and Mrs. Alice B. Maloney, national vice president for Oregon. The year just closing has been one of the best in the history of the federation. A better understanding has been created among the clubs, there has been a spreading of the federation spirit, a closer co-operation between the clubs, state and national has been effected, aside from many other achievements, including the publication of a state magazine. Mrs. Turner has, during her administration, which has been a most harmonious one, visited with almost every club in the federation, aside from organizing and visiting new clubs.

Saturday evening a large reception has been planned for at the Hotel Astoria, the state executive council and officers of the Astoria club receiving.
