

HELEN WILLS IS ON ROAD TO FULL RECOVERY

PARIS, June 5.—(United Press)—The popularity of Helen Wills, plucky American woman's tennis champion, was attested today by the hundreds of messages of best wishes which poured in upon her from friends in Europe and in her own country.

Recovering from the appendicitis operation performed Friday night was cheered by the hope held out to her by physicians that she might be able to play tennis this summer. It was believed tonight that the operation had been so successful that Helen might take to the courts again in six weeks, but her close friends feared her condition would be too weakened to permit her defense of the championship at Forest Hills late in the summer.

It will be impossible, of course, for the young California girl to appear at Wimbledon in the jubilee tournament beginning June 22. The management at Wimbledon today wired its sympathy and best wishes.

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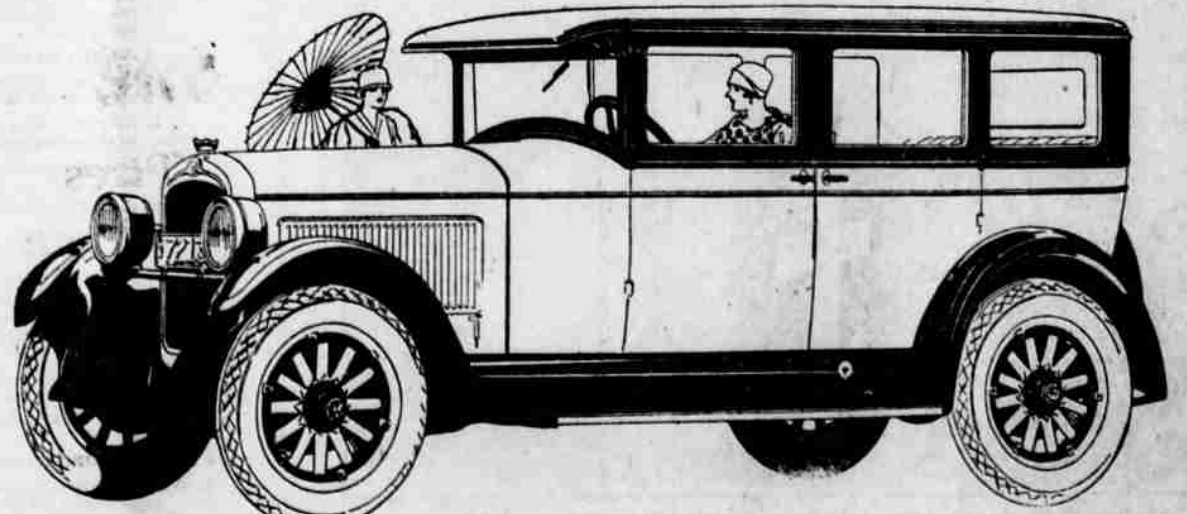
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
