

### Chicago Sheriff Must Serve Time in His Own Jail

CHICAGO, June 8. — (United News)—When Sheriff Peter M. Hoffman finishes breakfast Wednesday morning and strolls over to his office he will find two United States deputies waiting to lock him up in one of his own cells for 30 days.

But first the deputies may ask him to drop in at federal court and give the clerk a check for \$2500.

This is all because the sheriff was found guilty of contempt of the United States district court for granting overnight outings to Terry Druggan and Frankie Lake, two millionaire brewers who were inmates of the county jail last autumn.

The sentence of 30 days in jail and the \$2500 fine imposed by Federal Judge James H. Wilkerson, has been hanging over the sheriff's head for several months.

Late Tuesday the United States circuit court of appeals suddenly vacated the sheriff's stay of sentence and it now appears that he will be detained at his place of business continuously for the next 30 days.

Hoffman has one chance to evade going to jail immediately. That is a sudden order from the United States supreme court in Washington, to which his case has been appealed. But unless the supreme court acts speedily it will be too late.

Backed by a press that is unanimous in its demand for withdrawal, Brazilian officials are believed to have determined on such action no matter what inducements may be offered by the league for reconsideration.

now, and attributed the increased value to the entry of the reclamation service into the district.

R. E. Bradbury, president of the Klamath Irrigation district, appeared at the hearing. He requested that it be noted in the record that the district understood that the result of its original hearing of the Eberlein petition had been merely a recommendation to the government. At the same time he asked that the government take cognizance of the fact that the district had been within its rights under the law in conducting the hearing.

Eberlein himself was not present. He contended himself with the protest against the hearing as being anything else but ex parte, and insisted that the irrigation district and not himself should have been notified. Coffey stated that he regretted Eberlein had not appeared.

**Record to Washington**  
The entire record of the hearing will be forwarded to Washington, where it will be used in determining the merits of the petition of Eberlein to have his lands exempted from taxation by the district.

It was explained unofficially that the purpose of introducing the present land valuations, inflated beyond the value of ordinary farm lands because of their proximity to the city, was for the purpose of showing that the lands had been increased in value by reason of the reclamation service having entered this territory.

### FRISCO MAN VISITS LEAGUE OF NATIONS

GENEVA, June 8.—(United News)—Unafraid of entangling foreign alliances, H. A. Binder Tuesday presented credentials to the secretary of the League of Nations from the mayor of San Francisco accrediting him as envoy extraordinary to all Europe, including the league.

Binder asked for immediate interviews with Premier Briand of France and Sir Austen Chamberlain, British foreign secretary, but arrangements for the interviews have not yet been made.

### Folder Maps of National Forest Are Now Ready

PORTLAND, Ore., June 9.—(United News)—Free folder maps covering the Umpqua, Crater and Willowa national forests have been prepared by the United States forest service and are ready for public distribution. It has been announced by District Forester C. M. Grainger here.

The maps may be obtained in single copies either at the new post-office building, or from the forest supervisors at Roseburg, Medford or Willowa.

The Umpqua and Crater national forests are covered on one folder map while the Willowa forest map is in a separate one. The maps show the towns, roads and trails of the various regions with brief description of the scenic spots.

### Harney Valley Is Possessed of Big Subterranean

PORTLAND, June 8.—(United News)—That a subterranean body of water apparently exists at a depth of 30 to 50 feet below Harney valley in Harney county, and that it has been tapped for the irrigation, ultimately, of 200,000 to 250,000 acres of land, was the announcement in Portland today of William Farr of Burns.
