

PIRATES TAKE PENNANT LEAD FROM PHILLIES

The Pittsburgh Pirates, world's champions of 1925, took first place in the National league Wednesday.

Defeating the Phillies in a desperately fought 10 inning contest, McKechnie's men mounted to the top of the ladder, replacing the Reds who lost a 16-inning game to Brooklyn.

Huber's homer in the last of the ninth tied up the Pittsburgh-Philadelphia engagement, but the champs got two in the tenth and won 9 to 7.

Seven pitchers were used and 31 hits made.

Both the Reds and Robins scored two runs in the ninth inning at Brooklyn, the latter winning in the tenth, 4 to 2.

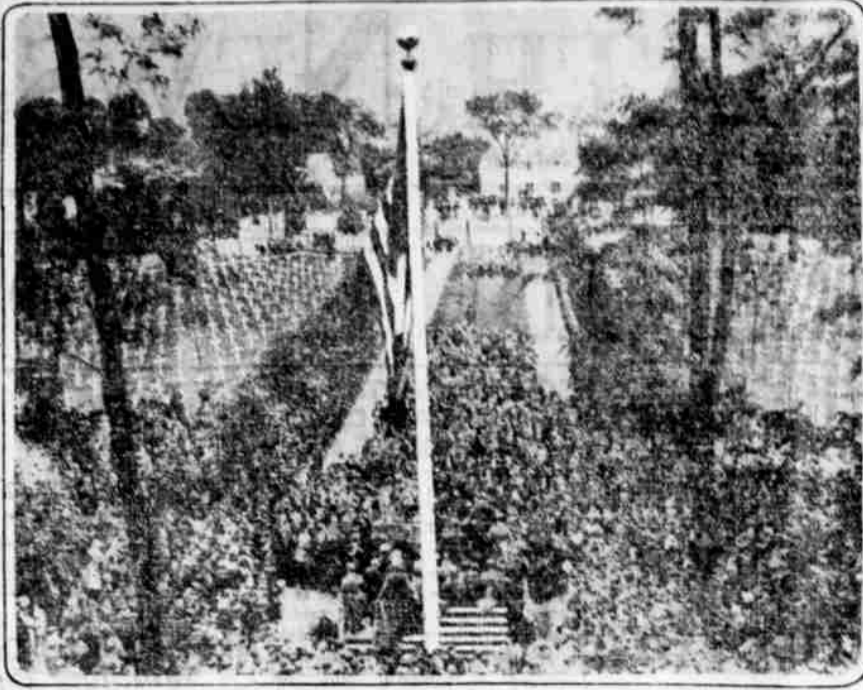

FORMBY, Eng., June 9.—(United News)—The American professional golfers showed improved form Wednesday in the north of England championship, and all qualified for the final 36 holes, which are to be played Thursday.

Bill Mehlhorn of Chicago was tied for the lead with two English pros, George Gadd of Roehampton and J. Adwick of Bolton, after the first 36 holes had been played. These three each had an aggregate of 146.

MARY BROWNE MUST DEFEND BIG CONTEST

PARIS, June 9.—(United News)—The hopes of Americans, the slim but tangible chance that would have been Helen Wills' had she not been stricken suddenly with appendicitis, are with Mary K. Brown, the veteran woman tennis star of the United States, who is to meet Suzanne Lenglen in the finals of the French hard court championships.

Miss Brown, a California sports-woman who excelled among her own countrywomen in both tennis and golf, defeated Katarina Bouman of Holland, 5-6, 6-2, in the semi-finals of the current tournament.

Mlle. Lenglen had less difficulty in beating Joan Fry of England, 6-2, 6-1, in the other semi-final match; The Franco-American final will be held Friday.

STIRBLING TO GRILLING TEST WITH CHAMPION

NEW YORK, June 9.—(United News)—Although Young Stribling is a slight favorite over Paul Berlebach in their light heavyweight championship bout at Yankee stadium Thursday night the odds do not accurately reflect the opinion of the experts who have seen both men in action during the past year.

The champion is extremely confident that the youthful challenger from the south cannot win. With a fighter of Berlebach's temperament, confidence means a lot.

Moreover, the critics point out that Paul has proved two important things: first, he can "take it," and second, he can punch. Stribling's gameness under severe punishment remains in doubt, since he has been knocked down but once in his fighting career. The Georgia youth has never shown a wallop to compare with the champion's.

The popular choice, and as a result, the betting odds fall upon Stribling, but the "wise money," as they say in New York, is holding off and probably will more than balance matters by the time the men enter the ring.

DEMPSEY WILL GO 3RD ROUND WITH JUSTICE

MADERA, Calif., June 9.—(United News)—Jack Dempsey's bout with the speed laws of Madera county is expected to go into its third round next Monday.

The heavyweight champion was outpointed in the first session when a speed cop ticketed him for traveling at a rate which the officer said was nearly 30 miles an hour. The second round also went to Madera by a decision.

Dempsey, according to his attorney, has promised to be here for a reckoning next week.

The attorney declared that Judge Bailey of Madera has shown prejudice against Dempsey. If Justice Bailey disqualifies himself he will set the court in which Dempsey is to be tried, according to District Attorney Mason Bailey. The possible alternate judges included Justice R. G. Cornell of Chowchilla, who sent Ralph de Palma to jail for ten days for speeding several years ago.
