

WORLD RECORD IS MASTERED IN TRACK MEET

CHICAGO, June 12. — (United Press) — One world's record was unofficially broken, six N. C. A. A. marks were shattered, and the University of Southern California piled up the highest team score in the annual N. C. A. A. track and field meet today.

Irving Martin, studying at Northwestern university, was the man who set what may become a new world record. He was timed in the 880-yard run in one minute 51.7 seconds, which is five seconds faster than ever a man was clocked before in that event.

The other record breakers today were Roland Locke, the spectacular Nebraska sprinter, who raced over the 220-yard course in 20.3 seconds; Spence of Detroit City college, who was clocked in the 220-yard low hurdles in 23.5 seconds; Haggard of Texas, who cleared the bar in the running high jump at six feet 7 1/4 inches; H. H. Phillips of Butler college, who covered the 440-yard run in 48.7 seconds; Bud Houser of Southern California, who hurled the discus 148 feet, 11 3/4 inches, and Paul Harrington of Notre Dame, who pole vaulted 13 feet, 3 inches.

All these are new records for the N. C. A. A., and Haggard's high jump was a new world's intercollegiate record.

Bud Houser, Olympic and world's champion discus thrower, won the event today with ease, hurling the platter 148 feet, 11 3/4 inches, for a new meet record. He finished second in the shot-put to Kuck of Kansas State Teachers' college, who heaved the 15-pound weight 50 feet, 3 1/4 inch.

SUZANNE WINS EASILY OVER MARY BROWNE

PARIS, June 12. — (United Press) — Suzanne Lenglen, who probably would have defeated Helen Wills or any other woman tennis player in the world, flashed today across the wet center court of the Racing club to defeat Mary K. Browne of California in the final match of the women's hard court championship.

Rain fell during part of the play.

The score was 6-1, 6-0, and it provides a fair measure of Suzanne's superiority over the American champion of the Wightman cup team. Miss Browne is a heady, crafty player. Suzanne is a marvel at speed with a genius for the spectacular and unexpected. Our own Helen Wills probably could not have beaten her.

"Mary played the smartest tennis I ever have seen," Vincent Richards said after the match today. "But she lacked the speed and youth to carry through a baseline defense. She tried an effective net attack until forced to fall back to the baseline."

Howard Kinsey, Elizabeth Ryan and other experts agreed with Richards' summation of the match.

Heavy rain threatened to prevent play altogether today, but regular sweeping of the court, and a final dusting with dry red sand made it possible to play this afternoon, although not under good conditions.

Helen Wills, the American champion, left the hospital for her hotel today, but was unable to see the meeting.

Mrs. Wills, however, was there, and afterward said Helen had predicted the match would end 6-1, 6-0, just as it did.

"Before leaving for the court I asked Helen's opinion," said Mrs. Wills. "She said she certainly wanted Mary to win, but I guessed the sets just as they came out. I thought the match was not spectacular, but rather slow, probably because of the heavy court, and the tendency of the players to be careful not to slip. Miss Lenglen's placements were admirable."

British Golfer Is Target Golf World Champion

LONDON, June 12. — (United Press) — Abe Mitchell, a British golfer, today won the Evening Standard's target golf competition at Moor park, with a score of 337 points.

Mitchell's first prize was approximately \$1,700.

It will take from two to three weeks for the sailing vessels to complete their trans-Pacific cruise over the 2,325-mile course.

Don Lee's Invader led the entries over the starting line, followed in close order by the Mariner, owned by Jack Barrymore, film star, a passenger on his own yacht.

The other cruisers, Walter Norne's Poinsettia, Clem Stose's Teva, Milton Hesselberger's Mollolu, and James Dickson's baby schooner, Jubilo, were but a few seconds behind at the flash of the starting gun.

A cheering throng of marine enthusiasts lined the beach and gave the racers a tremendous ovation as they pushed off on the classic cruise.

Man 'o War Wins Belmont Stakes At Famous Park

BELMONT PARK RACE TRACK, NEW YORK, June 12. — (United Press) — Man o' War, probably the greatest horse the American turf ever bred, has won the historic Belmont stakes again.

Not in person this time, but through his splendid son, Crusader, who gave a thorough beating to eight of the best three-year-olds the east could muster this afternoon.

When Samuel D. Riddle, Crusader's owner, led the glistering colt through the rain to the steward's stand to receive the \$500 in plate that goes with the rich purse, it was the third time that honor had gone to the Glen Riddle farm. Six years ago Man o' War himself won it. His progeny began arriving on the turf last year as three-year-olds, and the dynasty was started when American Flag stepped out in front.

Today's running was the fifty-eighth renewal of the Belmont. A crowd of 40,000 watched it through a steady rain that made the going bad, and the mile and a half was run in the rather slow time of 2:32 1/5. Espino was second and Haiste, with Sande up, was third.
