

MEDFORD WINS FROM KLAMATH IN FAST GAME

Street and Bloomenstein hooked up in an old fashioned pitching duel out at the fair grounds ball yard Sunday, in which the latter, with the aid of two homers, two errors and brilliant support, won the decision to the tune of 6 to 1.

The weather was perfect, and the great gathering of fans who turned out, were treated to some high class baseball over the full nine innings. The game at no time was a walk-away, and even up until the last man was out in the ninth inning the large crowd made no attempt to leave the scene of battle. In this frame, Clark, first man up, singled cleanly to center. Dubach walked, and so did Bloomenstein, but his walk was to the showers, Foley replacing him on the firing line. Aiken, next up, hit one on the nose good for two bases, scoring Clark, but Dubach stopped at third. At this stage of the game Foley proved a good relief hurler, and with the aid of a couple of called strikes that looked pretty low, retired Mathews, King and Montgomery via the strikeout route.

Medford's first run came in the fifth, when Blair, first up, dropped a Texas leaguer back of second, which Fuller dropped after a nice run. Bloomenstein sacrificed him to second. Blair looked out stealing third, but the ball was kicked out of Frenchie's hand. On the next pitched ball King threw to third, but Frenchie had one hand in his pocket, letting the ball roll into left field, and Blair scored. The next damage came in the seventh inning, when Wilson, first up, struck out, but a clean hit past short, for which Fuller made a nice try, put a man on first. Bloomenstein sacrificed him to second, from where he scored when Montgomery dropped a long fly.

What happened through the rest of the game matters little, as two runs was a lot in this game.

Medford played big-time baseball all through this game, but were not credited with all the glory, as the Pelicans sparked in places. Hanley, first up in the ninth, got a life on Fuller's error, but what might have been a rally, was nipped in the bud when Bannister, next up, hit a liner to Dubach, who started a twin killing. Long popped a long foul to King that was a hard chance, but the manager made a nice running catch of it with one hand, to retire the side.

According to those who have seen the Medford team in action on previous occasions, Sunday's game was their best exhibition up to date, and critics are inclined to believe it was just a little bit over their heads. With Street getting in better form each game and Medford suffering the loss of one of their hurling aces, the invaders are a good bet to carry away the honors from Medford when King sends his young men into battle against them again next time.

SOUTHERN OREGON PAGEANT SEAT SALE STARTS JUNE 15

The management of the big Southern Oregon pageant, "Blazing the Trail," announce that the sale of seats will open at the chamber of commerce building, Medford, on Tuesday, June 15, at 10 a.m. Notwithstanding the enlarged scope of the production, and the many new features, the producers have been enabled to reduce the prices, and they believe it will result in a greatly increased attendance.

As now advertised, the center boxes and the elevated seats in front of the grand stand will be \$1.50. The five end boxes and a section of 600 seats in the center of the grand stand will be \$1. All the rest of the grand stand, more than 1,000 seats, will be general admission for 50 cents. There will be no war tax. Mail orders are being received now at the pageant headquarters, 7 Sparta building. All mail orders must be accompanied by stamped, self-addressed return envelope. It hardly seems necessary to speak of the value of this kind of a production to the community. BERLENBACH IS READY DEFEND LAURELS WON

NEW YORK, June 14.—(United News)—Right on the heels of his decisive victory over Young W. L. Stribling, Paul Berlenbach, the Astoria assassin, who is willing to meet any fighter in his class, signed an agreement Monday with Humbert Fugazy to meet Jack Delaney for the world's light-heavy-weight championship.

The contract gave New York fans the prospect of two championship matches in July, as Pete Latzo, newly throned welterweight title holder, agreed to meet George Levine at the Polo Grounds, July 3. It will mark the Scranton boy's second appearance in the ring since he won the title from Mickey Walker, providing he beats Pete Harmon in Newark, June 22. If Harmon should win, Latzo would lose the Levine bout.

Fugazy will ask the New York state boxing commission to give him a date between July 5 and July 14 for the Berlenbach-Delaney go.

Meanwhile, the fans will whet their appetites with several stellar cards, including one Tuesday night at the Queensboro stadium, where an all-lightweight attraction has been booked. In the feature event Phil Bernstein will meet Stanislaus Ware.

have expressed themselves as favorably disposed toward re-flooding, while the Oregon members are "still between the devil and the deep sea," as it was expressed by A. W. Maloney, chairman of the commission. Following the dinner last night the commissioners requested that local sportsmen who recalled the original condition of the lower lake give the commissioners the benefit of their knowledge. Ed Averill, state game warden, said he had screens ready for the Wood river irrigation ditch intake—and that he didn't mean maybe. The screens were built and would be installed shortly.

Favors Open Season

Averill also agreed that no harm would be done fishing in upper Klamath lake by leaving the season open in the winter months when the fish are in the best shape.

A plea was made by Averill for observance of the game laws of Oregon.

"You have in Klamath recreational assets as great as the lumber industry, and the value of your wild life cannot be over-estimated," Averill said. "The value of fish and game taken in Oregon amounts to two or three millions of dollars a year. This does not take into consideration any of its other valuations such as sale of sporting goods, the money people who come here leave behind, and the good that is done to people by getting them out in the open."

Summer Resorts Here

Maloney also stressed this feature of Oregon. "There is no question but that Oregon is destined to become as great a summer resort state as is California a winter resort," he said. "The trouble is that the people of Oregon do not know their own state."

Seaford told of the monumental growth of commercial fishing on the Pacific coast. There was more fish landed in the harbor of Los Angeles than at such sea ports as Boston to Gloucester. Seaford is an international authority on commercial fishing.

Both the California game authorities were accompanied by their wives. William Lippincott, chairman of the Mt. Shasta patrol district of California, accompanied the Californians. Dan Goodsell, warden from Lakeview, and Art Fish, warden from Coos and Curry counties were also among the guests.
