

COLD WEATHER PREVENT GAMES IN BIG LEAGUES

For the first time in years, two baseball games were postponed in the middle of June because of cold weather.

New York fans who made the chilly trip to the Polo Grounds on Ebbett's field Wednesday afternoon to see the Giants or Robins perform, were greeted with the unusual sign: "No game, cold weather." As the result the Cincinnati and St. Louis teams left New York and Brooklyn for Philadelphia and Boston.

In the only American league game scheduled, the fast stepping White Sox pushed the aged Senators farther down the second division by winning 3 to 2. Ted Lyons bested Walter Johnson in a pitching duel. As a result of the defeat Washington dropped to sixth place while the Tigers advanced a peg, one point ahead of last year's pennant winners.

Pittsburgh stopped the energetic Braves, leaving the diamond on the long end of a 6 to 3 count and moving closer to the league leading Reds. The Cubs braced themselves at the expense of the Phillies 4 to 1. Blake went the route for McCarthy's rejuvenated team, while Art Fletcher called on three Philadelphia moundmen.

OAKLAND WINS IN CONTEST OF COAST LEAGUE

SAN FRANCISCO, June 16.—(United News)—Oakland gained a full game on Los Angeles in the Pacific Coast league standings by defeating Hollywood while Portland was scoring a one sided win over the circuit leaders.

The Oaks climbed back into second place as a result of their 1 to 0 victory, as Sacramento lost to San Francisco 10 to 2.

The Beavers pounded out 11 hits which, aided by three scrappier errors, resulted in an 11 to 3 verdict for Portland. In losing to the Seals, Sacramento errors also were conspicuous, not less than eight Senator misplays being recorded.

Ike Boone made his 15th, home run of the season in the first inning of the Mission-Seattle clash here. He scored another runner and paved the way for Mission's 4 to 3 win.

AMERICAN HAS LEAD IN GOLF WITH SCORE 66

LONDON, June 16.—(United News)—Displaying the most sensational golf ever seen on the difficult Sunningdale links, Bobby Jones of Atlanta, the American amateur champion, turned in a startling 66 Wednesday and led a field of 293 entrants in the first round of the qualifying play for next week's British open tournament. His card was two strokes better than the previous professional record and eight under the amateur record for the course.

As a result of the first day's play America loomed once more as a serious threat to British golf prestige. Only two of the 18 Americans entered were above 80 for 18 holes and Archie Compston, now a British pro, but an American citizen was second in the qualifying round, only three strokes behind the brilliant Bobby.

The youthful southerner, playing almost perfect golf, was three below four's going out at and coming in. He slipped up only twice in the round, once on the ninth when he missed a putt which he ordinarily

FIGHT CARD IS INTERESTING TO KLAMATH FANS

With the exception of the curtain-raiser event, the fight card scheduled for June 22, which will be staged at Scandia hall, is complete, according to announcement yesterday by Johnny Sylvester, who is promoting the affair.

The main event, a ten-round set, will put on the Dean 'Kid' Starkey, Klamath Falls, and Benny Dotson of Portland. In the semi-windup, which has indications of being a warm mill, Wilbur Harrington will meet Jimmie Harms of Sacramento, six rounds to a decision. Sator Fey and Buddy Crim, youthful slugger from the reservation, will mix gloves in the four-round preliminary. A curtain-raiser exhibition is being arranged for, but no definite selections have as yet been made, Manager Sylvester said.

While the entire card is being watched with interest, attention of the fans is being centered upon the Starkey-Dotson affair, which promises to be one of the fastest mills staged in the local ring. Starkey seems to be reigning favorite among fight devotees here, although Dotson has been exciting a great deal of comment by his clever ring tactics and undeniable ability to hit hard, fast and frequently.

Dotson is strong and well-knit for his years, but is only a youth and yields some advantage to Starkey because of the latter's age and major ring experience. The carpenter is about thirty and has been fighting for years, while Dotson is not yet twenty-one and has seen but five years in the squared circle.

Those five years have been fruitful ones, though, if figures mean anything. Entering the ring at fifteen, the Portland lad has participated in 44 ring battles, winning all of them but one. He has met some of the foremost contenders in his division, among them being Bill Kennedy, Dandy Dillon and Noble Cervantes, and has many knockouts to his credit.

Whether Benny will send the determined Starkey to the canvas for a winning count is a matter for conjecture, but all who have seen him in action admit that he is going to give the Kid the fight of his career.

NEW YORK, June 16.—(United News)—Sweden's champion hurdler and sprinter, Sten Pettersson, arrived in the United States Wednesday to compete in the hurdle races in the national A. A. U. championships at Philadelphia in connection with the sesqui centennial exposition.

Pettersson's world's record of 53 4-5 seconds for the 400 meter hurdles made at Paris last year, will be presented for acceptance at the next meeting of the International Amateur Athletic Federation.

LONDON, June 16.—(United News)—An all-American or all-French finals is possible in the men's singles at the Wimbledon tennis tournament, owing to the seeding of the players. Although the tourney is five days off American hopes for victory took a sharp drop Wednesday when the luck of the draw pitted the best United States representatives against the cream of Europe.

Mary K. Browne, captain of the American Wightman cup team, was drawn with the world's champion, Suzanne Lenglen, in the first round of the women's singles, while Vincent Richards will probably meet Henri Cochet, his conqueror in Paris last Thursday, in the second round.

The name of Helen Wills remained in the lists. She is in the second quarter of the drawings with Mrs. Molla Mallory, former American title holder, and Joan Fry.

Elizabeth Ryan of California is expected to meet Kitty McKane Godfree, one of England's best players, in the third round. Howard Kinsey and Count Salm are expected to clash in one of the earlier rounds of the men's singles.

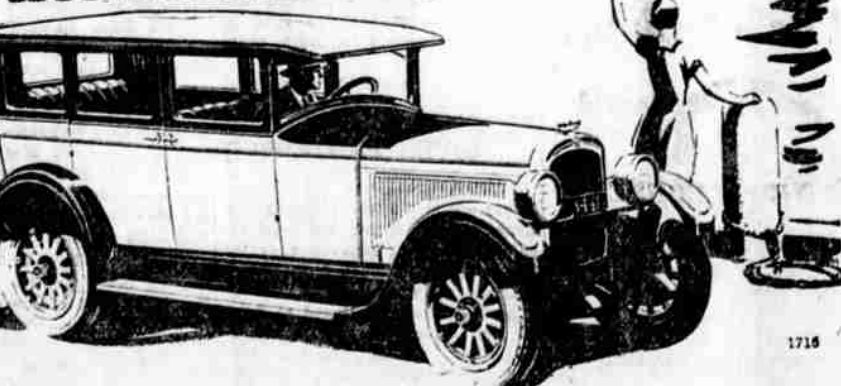


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
