

PIRATES EASED BY GIANTS TO SECOND PLACE

The world's champion Pirates were eased out of first place in the National League Thursday afternoon when the spirited Giants beat them in a sensational 13-inning battle, 6 to 5. Although Pittsburgh scored two runs in the 13th, McGraw's hustlers came back with three. Cincinnati, although idle with Philadelphia, because of threatening weather, moved into the league leadership by virtue of the Pirate defeat.

Charley Root, the crack Cub rookie, took a trimming from the Dodgers who won 10 to 9 in a see-saw battle. Ten innings were required.

Hornaby's Cardinals grabbed both ends of a double-header from the halting Braves, 4 to 2 and 6 to 2. Flint Rhem, leading moundsman in the National league, won the first game for St. Louis, while Keen brought the second on home.

The slugging Yankee bats were stilled by Blankenship at Chicago, and the White Sox won, 6 to 2. Only three hits, including a homer by Lazzeri, were made by the Huggins.

The Athletics and Tigers engaged in an old-fashioned slugfest, winning 17 to 9. Singularly enough the Athletics made only ten hits while Detroit was credited with 14.

Cleveland took a well-fought game from the Red Sox, 3 to 1.

Washington tried hard in the ninth to overcome a seven-run lead which St. Louis piled up, but fell two markers short and the Browns won, 9 to 7.

Williams, Schang and Durst hit home runs.

FRENCH RADICALS OPPOSED TO BRIAND

PARIS, June 17.—The French radicals who took control of the country by elections of 1924 have put themselves on record as ready to block the plans of Aristide Briand for a national union cabinet.

Despite the grave financial crisis which threatens the country the socialist-radical group, meeting Wednesday night, adopted almost unanimously a resolution opposing radical participation in a national union government. The resolution repudiates all idea of co-operation. It is believed to constitute a serious obstacle which may prevent acceptance by Edouard Herriot, former premier, of a post in the cabinet which Briand hopes to form.

Without Herriot, who is president of the socialist-radical party—numerically the strongest group in the chamber of deputies, it will be difficult for Briand to realize his ambition. In order to form a national union-ministry Herriot's presence is just as necessary as that of Raymond Poincare, who is wanted as finance minister.

Carpentier failed to show his old speed at any time during the encounter.

MARVEL GOLFER DISCOVERED IN ATLANTA MAN

LONDON, June 17.—(United News)—Bobby Jones of Atlanta rose to a new pinnacle of the golfing world Thursday by completing the 36 holes of the qualifying round for the British open championship in a miraculous 134.

His feat, dwarfing into insignificance the efforts of British and American stars, was hailed as an all-time record for tournament play.

Following his record breaking 66 Wednesday on the difficult Sunningdale links, the American amateur champion shot a beautiful 68 Thursday to lead his nearest opponent, George Gadd of Southampton, winner of the northern professional championship at Formby recently, by the wide margin of seven strokes.

Fourteen of the 17 invaders qualified. Joe Stein and Silas Newton failed to get under the 154 limit at Sunningdale, and John Rutter scratched.

As Jones, unperturbed by the large, fashionable gallery which followed him over the links, sank his last putt on the 18th green for a three-for-the-hole, a great cheer went up. Beautifully gownned London society women and men in silk hats and cutaways joined the throng which acclaimed the youth.

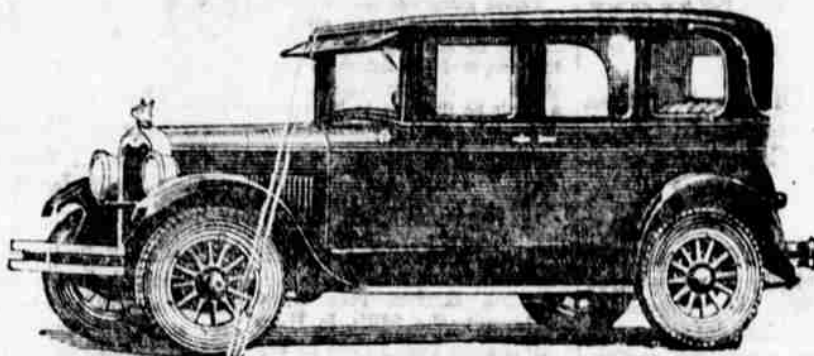

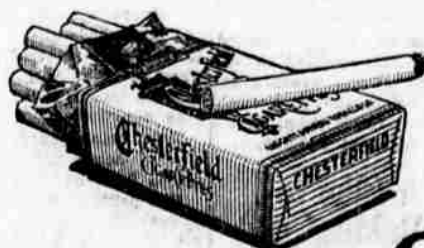
