ate the car, found Dempsey near Second and Main. His actions aroused suspicions and he was placed under arrest. Three watches were located on his person in a preliminary search for a gun, the officers say. Later but two watches were found; one in Dempsey's sock.

The denouement followed fast yesterday. One of the watches was

identified by William Bartley, another roomer at the Lake hotel, as belonging to him. Williamson, the night clerk, identified Dempsey as the man who had come from the hotel.

Second Man Found

The police then sought a man who had been seen in the company of Dempsey. The fellow proved to be Ernest J. Schramm, an iron worker. Both men had lived in cabin No. 10, Altamont across. Schramm owned the car and had brought Dempsey here with him, saying he regarded Dempsey as his friend. When the police told Schramm the evidence against Dempsey he began to think. He recalled how Dempsey had borrowed the car late at night and how he had seen him burning various articles in the stove, circumstances that he had given no attention.

Search of the ashes in the stove revealed a \$2.50 gold piece together with the handle of a purse that had been reported by a woman as stolen. The purse had contained about \$25.00.

The police believe they have further incriminating evidence against Dempsey, all of which will be reported to the grand jury which meets on Monday.

Great Yield of Grain Expected By County Agent

Henderson Says Recent Frosts Did Little Damage and crops in Tule Lake District Reported Excellent

A tremendous yield of grain is the expectation of County Agent C. A. Henderson after his return from a survey of the Tule lake district to locate frost damage. He found little damage from the recent frost.

"There is an exceptionally large acreage of grain, say 12,000 or

15,000 acres, that is in good shape," said Henderson. Another 3,000 or 4,000 acres need a good rain within the next few days. But there are several thousand acres in the uplands of the lake, that have been planted to grain that are questionable as to results and likely will amount to nothing more than pasturage.

"Due to the fact that the larger acreage is early this year it is barely possible that a tremendous yield may result."

There are 29 different corn demonstrations planted throughout the county and there is no evidence of it having been hurt. The rice was coming to a head, however, and this crop has been hit badly.

Henderson had been led to be-

lieve from various reports of the freeze of last week that the crop damage had been extensive. His investigations were an agreeable surprise, he said. There was more evidence of damage from the natural drought in the Tule lake area uplands than from frost, he found.
