

Minister Faces Trial on Charge Of Immorality

ASHEVILLE, N. C., June 19.—(United Press)—Two leading medical men of Asheville signed affidavits Friday which may exonerate the Rev. Ashley Chappell, pastor of the fashionable Central Methodist Episcopal church of this city, of charges of immorality at his trial before a court of clergymen July 20.

The affidavits were made by Doctors Carl V. Reynolds and M. C. Millender, and are to be given to the Rev. H. K. Boyer of Shelby, N. C., who will defend the pastor.

The Rev. Chappell has been suspended from his pulpit pending trial on the charges which resulted from his arrest by police in a house of questionable reputation in Memphis while he was attending the general conference of the Methodist Episcopal church.

The pastor contends he was forced to stop at the house while walking alone one evening.

Smuggled Liquor Flow Likely to Encounter Snags

OTTAWA, Ont., June 19.—(United Press)—Erection of steel gates on the Canadian-American border to reduce the flow of smuggled liquor into the United States and to protect Canada against smugglers from the south are among recommendations made Friday by the parliamentary committee which has spent two months investigating the question of smuggling.

The committee found that Canada has been losing \$51,000,000 annually on duties evaded by smugglers. Chief among articles smuggled into the United States is liquor. But all sorts of commodities are smuggled into Canada.

Among other recommendations made by the committee are the dismissal from office of R. W. Farrow, deputy minister of customs, and R. P. Farrow, deputy minister of customs at Montreal; reduction of the number of ports of entry from the United States to Canada; and the use of the mounted police against smugglers.

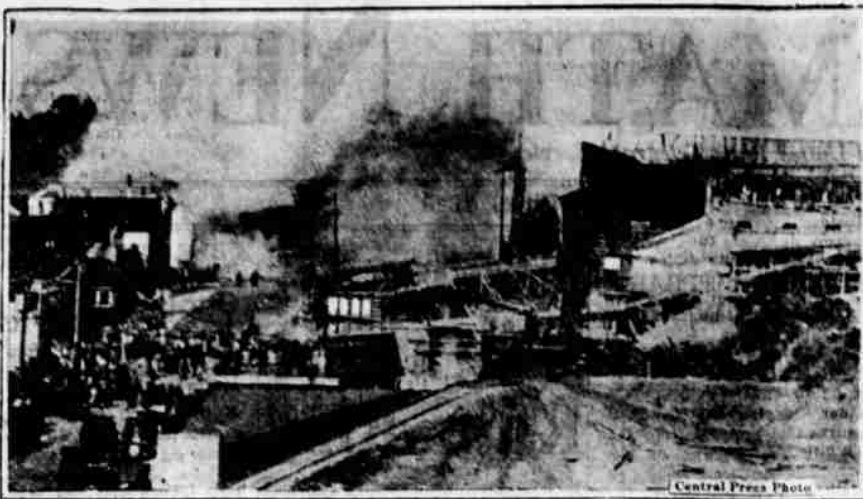

TACOMA, June 19.—(United Press)—Twenty-three persons indicted by a federal grand jury here for fraud in connection with the Ruby Beach Mining company case pleaded not guilty when arraigned today in United States Judge Edward E. Cushman's court.

The pleas were entered with the understanding that demurrers would be heard after June 28.

The company, it was proposed, would obtain gold from sand by a new and lucrative process. The government charged that the mails were used to defraud purchasers of worthless stock.

He was suggested for the job of Joseph Caillaux. In 1924 Pietri was sent to the chamber of deputies to represent Corsica. He is known as a keen student of finance, and he has made several brilliant speeches on the subject in the chamber.

Herriot is engaged on his financial program, which is known to be very complicated. He said today that he would adopt "democratic measures even if they are not liked by the moderates."

Pietri is the only moderate whose name appears in tentative lists. The other prospective members are radicals or socialists. Painleve carries on as minister of war. The life of the cabinet depends upon its ability to satisfy certain groups of the center which hold the balance of power.

MATHEMATICIAN FINDS A MOST DIFFICULT PROBLEM

CHICAGO, June 19.—(United Press)—Although an expert at figures, Mrs. Mabel G. Reinecke, collector of internal revenue, admits she is up against a mathematical puzzle. Last year at this date 41,999 persons had paid \$23,000,000 in income taxes. For the same period this year only 26,400 persons have paid but the total collection is \$23,000,000—the same as last year.

Grade Crossings Are Blamed For Many Accidents

SAN JOSE, Calif., June 19.—(United Press)—Grade crossing collisions between trains and automobiles in this section have claimed seven lives this week. Four of the fatalities occurred Friday.

Two brothers, John and Frank Koster of Oakland and San Jose respectively, were killed when a south-bound Southern Pacific passenger train hit their machine at a city crossing.

In two other similar accidents in this section, George D. Jackson, 50, and Lawrence Hawes, 19, lost their lives.

The Koster automobile was crushed beneath the locomotive of the passenger train. Carried 125 feet along the tracks the demolished machine finally caught against the ties and tipped the engine and two baggage cars into a ditch.

Two motorists were killed by trains Sunday and another Tuesday.

According to the rumors more men are now under surveillance for participation in the liquor scandal. Whether or not any of these include officers is not definitely known.

RANGE HORSES BRING ONLY 25 CENTS A HEAD

LONDON, June 19.—(United Press)—Ten thousand foot-weary women tonight departed for homes throughout the United Kingdom after participating in a great peace pilgrimage which thronged Hyde

Park with women protesting against war.

Buses, trams and trains carried the women home, but they had fulfilled their intention of walking to London as an evidence of sincerity and a few could boast that they had walked nearly 200 miles. Some of the pilgrims started home afoot, but most of these lived in nearby communities.
