

HOME SLUGGERS POUND OUT TWO REAL HOMERS

Cavemen Bow to Slants of Sage, While Fuller and Matthews Clout Complete Circle on Local Field

Some 1500 howling baseball fans and fanettes were present at the fair grounds last Sunday when Sage, the young right-handed pitching star of the Pelican ball club, held the cave men to 7 hits and retired 11 via the strike-out route. Sage was in great form and after getting off to a bad start, allowing the hostiles to score three times in the first inning and one in the third, pulled himself together and was master of the situation for the remainder of the afternoon.

The fielding sensation of the matinee was that of Fuller, who guards the short patch for Klamath Falls, when he slid headlong over to second base for Droulett's liner to force Chaney at second and retire the side in the seventh inning. Rayness, playing third, made a nice effort for a liner hit over the bag but came up without the ball.

Smith, first up in the first inning rolled to second and was thrown out at first. Chaney lit a low liner to left which Matthews dropped, after making a nice run. J. Blevens next up dropped a Texas leaguer between right and center, putting Chaney on third. Both runs counted when Droulett lost one in the alfalfa for four bases.

Again in the third inning Smith leg off by grounding out to Fuller, but Chaney walked and went to third on Bleven's second hit of the day, from where he scored, when Droulett poled a long sacrifice fly to Montgomery. Another one of the Blevens family grounded to Duback who retired him at Aiken-ville and ended the cavemen's scoring for the day.

Both teams played shutout ball in the third inning but Noel, first up in the fourth, got a hit off purpose's glove and gave way to Clark as runner. Aiken, next up hit one for two bases, scoring Clark and going to third on the play for the plate. Duback popped to first and Montgomery lifted one to short. Fuller lined to second who over-threw first, letting Aiken score and putting Fuller on second. Matthews hit a liner to second and went to second when the ball got away counting Fuller. King singled to right, scoring Matthews and went to second on the throw. Sage popped a high foul to Smith for the third out.

Fuller opened the sixth with what everyone thought a home, when Matthews, next up, contributed another ball to the alfalfa patch over the right field wall.

Smarting from defeat in their last two starts, the Pelicans were a much improved ball club. Manager King juggled his lineup, putting Matthews in left, Noel in center and Montgomery in right. While the change did not seem to strengthen the outfield to any great extent, it did seem to improve the sticking and what it takes to win ball games. With a "headup" ball club like the Pelicans were Sunday, there should be a different story to tell when they meet Medford next Sunday on the latter's field.

WOMAN CHAMPION OF GOLF IS MERE GIRL

HARLECH, Eng., June 21.—(United News)—A slip of a miss, Mlle. Simone de la Chaume, 17-year-old French champion, startled English women golfers by her accurate putting in the opening rounds of the ladies' British open golf tournament, which opened Monday after six weeks' play.

Mlle. de la Chaume easily defeated Miss Lobbett in the initial round, 4 to 2, and Miss Pearson in the second, 7 and 6.

The only American representative is Rosamond Sherwood, who drew byes until the third round. Three other American women scratched.

The tournament was to have started May 10, but was called off because of the British general strike.

BRITISH GOOFY AS GOLF STARTS ON BIG COURSE

ST. ANNES, England, June 21.—(United News)—With the opening of the British open golf championship tournament, less than 24 hours off, Bobby Jones of Atlanta threw consternation into the ranks of English golfers Monday by turning in a card of 70 in a foursome practice match over the St. Annes Links, equalling the amateur record for the course.

Combined with his spectacular 134 for 36 holes at Sunningdale last week in the qualifying rounds for the title play, the Atlantian has taken only 294 strokes in 54 holes of difficult play.

T. D. Armour and George von Elm, the Americans, and J. H. Taylor, the British veteran, were the other members of the foursome.

In another practice match, Joe Kirkwood, paired with Silas V. Newton, the American, lost on the 18th green to Watts Gunn and Bill Mehlohn. All made approximately 72 for the course.

A long list of great golfers of the world will begin early Tuesday to move from the clubhouse of the Lytham and St. Annes courses in the three-day procession that is to decide the British open championship.

REDS CONQUER CHICAGO AFTER BITTER CONTEST

In one of the longest and most exciting games this season, the league leading Reds Monday afternoon conquered Chicago 6 to 5, after 16 ding-dong innings.

Twice the Cubs seemed to have the game in hand, only to have Cincinnati rally again. With the Windy City outfit holding a 3 to 1 advantage going into the last half of the ninth, the Reds knocked out two runs. In the 13th, the Cubs scored two markers in their half, only to have the home team even the count.

Pittsburgh won a slugging match from St. Louis 13 to 11. Ten pitchers and 31 players were used. The victory enabled the world's champion Pirates to cling to the Reds' heels, while it broke the Cards' winning streak. The Giants took advantage of poor opposition and smothered the Phillies, 10 to 3. Terry and Frish hit homers.

Brooklyn and Boston split a double header, the Braves winning the opener 8 to 7, while the Robins annexed the nightcap 6 to 4. The first time went two innings overtime, after the Robins had tied the count in the ninth with a five-run rally.

In the American league the Indians strengthened their hold on second position by beating the White Sox and sending them to fourth place. Shaute was in rare form and Cleveland won, 5 to 2.

The Athletics bested Boston in a hard-fought eleven-inning game 7 to 6. The Red Sox had scored a run in the overtime session, but Philadelphia came back with two. Jacobsen and Welch clouted fuor-ply blows.

Detroit picked up a little lost ground by virtue of 5 to 4 victory over the Browns. Zachary was charged with the defeat.

Howard Kinsey of California made it two straight for the American representatives by toying with the England veteran, C. P. Dixon, to win 6-2, 6-1, 6-1.

D. Strolem, an American, was beaten by T. Timmer of Holland 6-2, 6-2, 6-1. Baron de Kerhling defeated M. Feret, the flashy Frenchman 7-5, 6-4, 2-6, 6-3.

Colonel H. G. Mays, Anglo-Canadian, won over J. E. Pogson-Smith, 6-2, 6-1, 6-3. Flaquer, the Spanish Davis cup player, beat J. Olmstead 8-6, 6-4, 3-6, 7-5.

In an exhibition doubles match, Suzanne Lenglen lost, paired with Elizabeth Ryan of California, the French girl bowed to Mrs. L. A. Godfree of England and Katerina Boumann of Holland, 8-6.

In the first round of the women's singles, Mary K. Browne, ace of the American forces with Helen held next Tuesday night without fail.

The other boxers on the card are also impatient to rub rosin, but they agreed with Sylvester as to the wisdom of postponing the card until next Tuesday.
