Parking Program Is Discussed at Council Meeting

As cars are parked at present along both sides of Main street there is an average of 18 feet left for moving traffic. Between 22 and 25 cars are parked in 200 feet of the 48-foot street.

If they are parked horizontally with the street there will be 32 feet left for traffic. About 22 cars may be parked in the same distance.

But if they are parked on a sharper degree of angle there will be 22½ feet of space left for traffic, and about 39 cars may be parked.

All this was figured on about 3 o'clock yesterday morning in practical fashion by Cal Crews and Charles N. Coseboom. Cars were placed at various angles while the street was deserted in the experiment. All this was on behalf of the various civic organizations of the city.

Coseboom made a plat showing the various suggestions and this was presented and discussed at the city council meeting last night. No action was taken.

It was also a suggestion of Crews, taxi owner, that the different cab companies be asked to co-operate in keeping but one car on the stand at a time. Others could be parked on side streets and driven into position when the first one was hired.

Oregon Trunk Is Ready to Crowd Road Building

BEND, Ore., June 21—If the Southern Pacific agrees to joint use rights of its new line south from Paulina, the Oregon Trunk will be in Klamath Falls five or six months after construction work is started. W. P. Turner, president of the Oregon Trunk, said when in Bend today. He reiterated that no construction work will start on the extension south until an agreement with the Southern Pacific has been reached.

Mr. Turner was in Central Oregon today on a routine visit. In company with other rail officials and Portland business men, he visited Prineville today.

PORTLAND STATES THIS CITY BOOMING

The principals are the land settlement committee of the Oregon Development fund, the Union Pacific and the communities of Pendleton, Hermiston, Irrigon and Boardman. Some 30,000 acres are involved in the plan.

Disabled Vets in Annual Convention At Atlanta, Ga.

ATLANTA, Ga., June 21—(United News)—Crippled, blind, or perhaps with a lung missing, but none of them without a physical defect of some kind, 5,000 disabled American veterans of the world war opened their annual national convention here Monday.

A feature of the opening session was the reading of a message from President Coolidge, promising that "whatever properly may be done to restore these disabled veterans to their former places in their communities or to alleviate their condition" would be done by the government.

Madame Schumann-Heink, called the "mother of the A. E. F." sang at the opening of the convention, which is presided over by National Commander John W. Nathan. Among the delegates is John R. McQuigg, national commander of the American Legion.

EUGENE IS GROWING AT ALARMING PACE

EUGENE, June 21—Eugene's estimated population is 20,000 according to a letter sent to the Chamber of Commerce of the state of New York which is issuing a directory of cities in the United States with more than 5,000 population. While the figures of the census of 1920, which gives Eugene a population of 10,593, will be used, the revised figures, taken from the unofficial census of two years ago, were given by the local chamber in response to an inquiry sent here.
