

OAKLAND LOSES CHANCE TO GAIN ON LOS ANGELES

SAN FRANCISCO, June 22.—(United News)—Oakland missed a chance to gain on Los Angeles in the Pacific Coast league race Tuesday. The Angels were beaten 4 to 3, by Mission, but the Oaks also dropped their Portland game, 10 to 4.

The Los Angeles team could hit Barfoot effectively in only one inning, the sixth, when three runs were scored. Crandall pitched well for the losers, but was not given as steady support as Barfoot received.

Kunz started for Oakland and was hammered for four runs in the opening inning. The Oaks looked dangerous in the eighth, but could not overcome the big lead.

Sacramento pushed San Francisco further into the cellar by defeating the Seals, 7 to 6. It was a free hitting game, decided by the Senators' score in the eighth. Seattle tied up its Hollywood game in the ninth and the teams played through the 17th inning, before Hollywood won 9 to 7.

BOYLE'S ACRES TO SEE TUNNEY FIGHT DEMPSEY

NEW YORK, June 22.—(United
News)—The next fight for the
world's heavyweight boxing cham-
pionship probably will be held at
Boyle's Thirty Acres, the mammoth
arena in Jersey City, with Gene
Tunney as champion Jack Demp-
sey's opponent.

Tex Rickard, the fight prom-
oter, definitely announced Tuesday
that Tunney would be in the ring
and indicated that the Jersey arena
would be the scene of the blood-
shed. A few minutes before, Tex
had applied to the New York state
boxing commission for permission
to stage the fight in Yankee sta-
dium. It was a weak gesture which
meant nothing, and the commission
turned down the application.

Rickard then remarked that the
"fight would be taken else-
where," and told newspapermen

that Boyle's Thirty Acres was an
ideal location and that the top price
would be \$25 and that a record
house could be expected. He left
an obvious conclusion to be drawn.
Instead of altogether clarifying
the befuddled heavyweight situa-
tion, Tuesday's development served
in some ways to make it more com-
plex.

After denying Rickard's applica-
tion, the commission unanimously
decided to enforce a rule that
champions must defend their titles
within six months or forfeit them
as far as New York state was con-
cerned, and that any boxer meet-
ing in another state a champion,
whose title was declared forfeited
would be liable to suspension in
New York.

That meant that Dempsey was
automatically suspended by the
commission and that Tunney would
incur its displeasure if he went
into the ring against the cham-
pion in New Jersey.
