

VARSITY CREWS NOW TRAINING FOR BIG EVENT

POUGHKEEPSIE, N. Y., June 23.—(United News)—With the intercollegiate regatta but five days away, most of the varsity crews in training here were sent over the four mile course Wednesday in time trials.

Columbia, Syracuse, Pennsylvania, Cornell, Washington and Wisconsin took turns on the straightaway in an effort to discover how much further training is needed before the start of the varsity race next Monday.

After the trial spin, Dad Vail, Wisconsin coach, opined that his charges were all gentlemen and collegiates but very poor sweep-swingers. He held little hope for them in the big race.

The Navy crew spent most of the day practicing starts. Joe Butler, the midshipmen's coach, said that despite a heavy shell, rough water next Monday would not lessen the navy's chances of winning.

Rusty Callow's Huskies from the university of Washington, went over the course and this, coupled with the short race at Princeton has put the crew on edge.

Although not officially timed Ky Ebright's California shell swept down the Hudson from the start at Krum's Elbow to the finish at Kaal's rock in impressive performance. Observers said that they have stroked higher than any crew at the racing colony here this year.

WILD MUSTANGS ARE MENACE TO FARMERS

AUSTIN, Nev., June 22.—After rounding up more than 1,000 wild horses in the mountains in the Reese river valley district, ranchers of that vicinity found themselves unable to stem the rush of the animals for freedom, only 26 being captured. Another drive is planned for the near future.

The increase in the number of these mustangs has become a serious problem for the district. They not only destroy water holes, but entice domesticated animals from their ranges and devour the feed needed for cattle.

Dictatorship Has Shown Itself in Governing France

PARIS, June 23.—(United News)—The head of dictatorship has shown itself in France with the announcement that Aristide Briand, advised and supported by Joseph Caillaux, to whom will be given wide powers for stabilizing the French financial situation, has formed a government.

The daring, dictatorial return to power of Joseph Caillaux, barred from many towns of France a few years ago for having trafficked with the enemy in war-time, constituted a sensation when Briand announced his new cabinet and the conditions on which Caillaux had been induced to enter it. Not only did Caillaux, who will be minister of finance, exact promises guaranteeing his freedom of action in office, but he is believed to have aided in the choice of some members of the cabinet.

The appointment of General Adolphe Guillaumat, the first general for years to fill the position of minister of war, is believed to be the work of Caillaux.

The new cabinet is as follows: Premier and minister of foreign affairs, Aristide Briand; minister of justice, Pierre Laval; minister of the interior, Jean Durand; minister of finance, Joseph Caillaux; minister of war, General Adolphe Guillaumat; minister of the navy, Georges Leygues; minister of commerce, Senator Fernand Chapal; minister of public works, Daniel Vincent; minister of colonies, Leon Perrier; minister of agriculture, Binet-Walmer; minister of labor, A. J. Durfour; minister of pensions, Paul Jourdain.

KING OFFENDED WHEN SUZANNE DID NOT SHOW

LONDON, June 23.—(United News)—Suzanne Lenglen, in an interview with the United News Wednesday night, told her side of the episode which kept Queen Mary and 20,000 spectators at the Wimbledon tennis championships waiting for an hour and a half, and announced she certainly would play Thursday.

"I didn't know I was scheduled to play singles," she said, explaining her tardiness at the courts. "I was greatly upset when I arrived at Wimbledon about 3:30 p. m. and learned I should have been there at 2 o'clock to play Mrs. C. J. Dewhurst. I knew nothing about it," Suzanne emphasized.

When I received the morning newspapers at my hotel there was no announcement that I was to play singles. At 12:30 p. m. I received a telephone message from Wimbledon to the effect that I was scheduled to play against Mrs. Dewhurst at 2 p. m.

"Immediately I sent a message to Wimbledon officials stating that I was not desirous of playing singles before the most important doubles match of the tournament, the one in which Didi Vlasto and I were scheduled to meet the Americans, Elizabeth Ryan and Mary K. Browne.

"That done I went to lunch, a nice, cheery affair, and then motored to Wimbledon, arriving at 3:20 o'clock.

"I was greatly surprised when the authorities asked me why I hadn't arrived in time to play the singles match. I told them I was not in the best of health and wanted to concentrate my efforts on the doubles match with the Americans and would then engage in the singles contest if the officials desired.

The consultation with the authorities which followed unnerved me so much, because of my poor health, that I felt I could not play at all Wednesday.

"I am happy to say that everything was finally smoothed out, mainly because of the splendid sportmanship of the American team which was willing to postpone the match until Thursday afternoon."

"The match is scheduled for 3 o'clock and I certainly will play."

REDS MAINTAIN LEAD BY POINT OVER PIRATES

Cincinnati maintained its one-point advantage over the world's champion Pirates Wednesday afternoon while St. Louis regained some of the ground it had lost because of defeats administered by Pittsburgh.

The Reds lost to Chicago, 5 to 3, in ten innings after a near-riot had been precipitated by Luque and Charley Root. The Cuban was hit in the temple by a pitched ball in the Reds' half of the fifth inning.

Root, the Cub pitcher and first batter up in the sixth, was then hit by one of Luque's deliveries. Root charged Luque had hit him intentionally. A hot argument followed but the moundmen were pacified, and the game was continued.

Pittsburgh lost to the Cards, 6 to 2. Haines had the Pirates eating out of the palm of his hand, allowing them but five hits. Hornsby got another homer.

Brooklyn took both ends of a double header from the slipping Braves 3 to 1 and 6 to 4. Ninth inning rallies won both games. Only the victory put the White Sox in second place and dropped Cleveland to fourth, behind the Athletics.

The Giants-Phillies double-header, and the Athletics-Washington game were postponed because of rain.
