

MICKEY WALKER IS RETIRED BY KNOCKOUT WAY

MADISON SQUARE GARDEN, New York, June 24. — (United News)—Mickey Walker, who recently lost his welterweight title to Pete Latzo, failed to come back Thursday night, and although he fought with all his Irish heart, lost by a technical knockout to Joe Dundee of Baltimore in the eighth round.

Dundee, hard faced and hard hitting, provided a gory spectacle by ripping open an old cut over the former title holder's left eye.

After two minutes and 58 seconds of the eighth round the contest was stopped because of the sorry sight presented by Walker.

Mickey was still mixing things furiously, boring in and exchanging wallops, but his body was covered with blood, much of which had splattered on to Dundee and the referee for the previous three rounds.

When the bout was stopped Dundee was leading by a good margin. The Baltimore boy won every round, but the first.

Dundee's weight was announced as 143½, and Walker as 145, one pound over the welterweight limit.

Joe Dundee's brother, Vince, appeared in the first preliminary and won a decision over Carl Courtney of Oklahoma in four fast rounds.

Benny Touchstone, Florida light heavyweight champion, knocked out Jack Monroe of Omaha in the fourth round of a scheduled six rounds.

Klamath Golfers Invited to Take Part in Tourney

Klamath Falls golfers are going to be represented at the big golf tournament to be staged at Burns on July Fourth, and the Reams Golf Club of Klamath Falls will send a team there to contest for the two silver loving cups that have been hung up as first and second prizes.

W. A. Rounseville, head of the Burns Golf Club, was a visitor to this city yesterday with the idea of working up far greater success than he anticipated. He found two fans in the persons of James McGuire, Sr., and Charles Roberts, and they took to the Burns idea like a duck takes to water, so Klamath Falls will no doubt be represented at the tournament.

Local golfers have been pounding away at practice on the Reams course for some time past, and a number of real artists along this line have been developed. The golf course has been improved to a marked degree and already an expenditure of about \$18,000 has been made.

The Reams golf course lies on the Keno highway and faces Lower Klamath lake, and the membership in the club has been subscribed.

AMERICANS IN FRONT AS GOLF CONTEST STARTS

ST. ANNES, England, June 24.—Of the 53 golfers who will tee off Friday in the final round of the British open championship, eleven are Americans, including the six leaders at the end of Thursday's play. The United States simply swept the links during the first 36 holes, placing nine men in the first eleven.

Bobby Jones and Bill Mehlhorn led the field at the end of Thursday's play with 144 each, followed closely by Walter Hagen with 145. At Watrous and Fred McLeod, 146, and George von Elm 147.

As a result of Thursday's play an American victory seems a certainty for only a golf miracle can bring to the fore the few good British pros who are still in the running.

The American sweep is more impressive when it is realized that seventeen Americans were entered in the qualifying rounds, which saw 293 golfers tee off. Only six United States players, therefore, have been eliminated, including Watts Gunn and Roland Mackenzie, the amateurs, while 234 players from England and other countries have been dropped.

Never before have American golfers so completely vanquished the British. The United States has won the open title three times in the last four years, but such sustained brilliance on the part of the entire team is something novel to the English.

The final round of 36 holes will be played Friday and only 53 of the 160 or so golfers who qualified will be allowed to play, the others having been dropped because their scores were more than 15 days above that made by Jones and Mehlhorn, the leaders.

RETIREMENT OF SUZANNE MAY BE ANNOUNCED

WIMBLEDON, England, June 24.—(United News)—Suzanne Lenglen may discontinue her play in the Wimbledon tournament.

Immediately after the premier woman tennis player had suffered her first defeat in women's doubles on the famous Wimbledon courts, she fainted in her dressing room, and was taken to her hotel in London.

Jacques Brugnon and Jean Borotra, members of the French team, announced Thursday that Suzanne's continuance in the jubilee tournament depended entirely upon the verdict of doctors who will examine her.

"We are convinced she is in the poorest health," Borotra told the United News. "She is suffering from a severe cold."

Miss Lenglen's decision will be made Friday morning. If she decides to play she will not be the overwhelming favorite to capture the women's singles title which she has been in former years.

Paired with Didi, Suzanne lost a thrilling three-set duel with the all-California doubles team of Elizabeth Ryan and Mary K. Browne, 3-6, 9-7, 6-2. In her seven years of play at Wimbledon the French girl has never before been defeated in doubles.

For a while it was feared that it would be necessary to find a substitute for Harrington, but he announced yesterday that his hand would be in condition by Tuesday.

Ten Millions in Damage by Rains In Danube Valley
