

Ashes of Love Causes Man to Murder His Wife

(MINEOLA, L. I., June 24.—(United News)—Ashes of the last love, kindled again by the insistence of a man who loved from afar under Mexican skies, and fanned by the jealous imagination of a husband, were responsible for the tragedy in Long Island society, which occurred Tuesday night, when Sydney E. Brewster, 29, killed his 26-year-old wife and himself in their home at Glenhead.

This explanation of the murder and suicide committed by wealthy real estate man was given by the district attorney and the coroner after an inquest Thursday, during which Brewster's motive was revealed with the introduction of a torn letter, addressed to Mrs. Frances Lyon Brewster, which had been found in the dead man's wallet.

A man who blamed himself "Rad," and was at the time in Parral, state of Chihuahua, Mexico, wrote the letter, but it probably never will be known whether Mrs. Brewster ever reciprocated his feelings, nor what story she told her husband after he had found the missive. But the man's one thought was to come where he could see the beautiful Mrs. Brewster "even for a little." The woman in the case was not incriminated to any extent, beyond the indication that she had written to "Rad," and that he once had held her hands in his own.

Spiritualist Church Nearly Ready • But Lacks Pastor and Congregation



A \$300,000 church building nears completion at Leroy, a village in southern Illinois. It has a heavy endowment and stands ready to serve the community largely. But the church has neither pastor nor congregation. The situation is the result of a clause in the will of J. T. Crumbaugh, a former Leroy resident, which specified the erection of the building as a Spiritualist church. But there is no spiritualist pastor near Leroy nor any considerable number of believers in the spiritualist religion. Until other disposition is made, the church will be used as a library, funds for which have been provided in the will.

Another Point of Etiquette Decided By Band of Women

DEL MONTE, Calif., June 24.—(United News)—Another fine point of etiquette has been settled and by the women themselves. It is perfectly proper for men to keep their hats on their heads while with women in commercial elevators.

A committee of women managers of American skyscrapers presented their views on the problem at the annual convention of the National Association of Building Owners and Managers.

Naturally there's a jolt for the men in the concession. Miss Clara C. Cramer of Chicago, chairman of her committee said that reason women no longer demand deference in commercial elevators as in hotels and apartments is because they regard themselves on a parity with men in the commercial world.

"When a woman enters an office or in office building she generally does so on business," said Miss Cramer. "In business women are on the same level with men. They ask no special privileges and are willing to play the game in full conformity with the rules."

CIVIC SOCIETIES TO BOOST BOND ELECTION

PORTLAND, Ore., June 20.—(United News)—"Fisher's luck" certainly was with James Robinson when the fact that he had a fishing reel in his hand saved his life.

Vet Training To Be Extended For Two Years

WASHINGTON, June 24.—(United News)—Within a few days congress probably will extend for two years the system of vocational training which was inaugurated after the war to teach injured survivors professions or trades adapted to their condition.

The law and appropriations for this work expire June 30, but at the insistence of service men, the house recently passed a bill extending it for two years more and it follows farm relief on the senate calendar. The measure may go to the President for signature this week. Prompt action has been urged by the convention of disabled veterans meeting at Atlanta this week.

The measure will affect only a relatively small number of veterans. It was said at the Veterans' bureau.

About 4,300 are receiving occupational training now, but nearly half of these will complete their work by June 30. Since the war occupational training has been given to nearly 200,000 veterans at a cost to the government of \$633,000,000.

Slightly more than 5,000 veterans are still in hospitals, but there is no way of knowing how many of these will want occupational training or when they will be able to receive it.

Set Fires That Glory Might Be Heaped on Them

MINEOLA, L. I., June 24.—(United News)—Fred Pearsall, a captain in the volunteer fire department of Rockville Center, L. I., was one of four members of the organization who set fires here and there for the sake of a thrill and the glory of having their own hose company always arrive first at the spot.

Pearsall was sentenced to two and a half years in Sing Sing prison Thursday, Lieut. W. H. Kruger was sent away for from five to ten years and two privates in the ranks, including George Pearsall, Fred's brother, were sentenced to the reformatory.

Woman to Serve Long Jail Term For Killing Babe

LEWISTON, Mont., June 24.—(United News)—Convicted of involuntary manslaughter in administering beating which resulted in the death a year ago of Dorothy Stewart, then four, and her stepdaughter, Mrs. Elsie Stewart, 21, who since the death of Dorothy has become a mother, must serve the maximum penalty prescribed for her offense. In district court here this afternoon she was sentenced to serve from five to ten years in the state penitentiary at Deer Lodge by Judge Baker.
