Wheat Damaged by Fire; Estimated Loss Is \$50,000

THE DALLES, Ore., June 26.—(United Press)—Fire that destroyed more than 400 acres of standing wheat in the Petersburg district, five miles east of The Dalles was brought under control late this afternoon when hundreds of men formed a line at Fifteen Mile Creek and smothered the flames. Between 500 and 700 acres of pasture land also was burned.

The loss was estimated between \$30,000 and \$50,000 virtually all covered by insurance.

Wheat fields on the F. A. Seufert, Sam Tethrow, Chester Sparr, W. E. Crawford and other ranches were burned over.

The flames, fanned by a high wind made rapid progress through the heavy grain fields, many expected to average better than 30 bushels to the acre at the threshing next week.
