

WASHINGTON VICTOR GREAT VARSITY RACE

POUGHKEEPSIE, N. Y., June 29. (United News)—In as thrilling and desperately contested a race as ever has been witnessed in 29 years of intercollegiate regatta history, Washington University's stalwart crew rowed the heart out of the Navy eight and won the annual boat race on the Hudson by half a length.

Holding steadily to their powerful but slower stroke, the Huskies from the far west withstood the midshipmen's college in the final mile from the Suspension bridge and swept across the finish line in a maelstrom of cheers, whistles and sirens, victors for the third time in the last four years. Besides, the Navy there was none of the eight crews in the varsity race which could adequately contest with the winners.

Syracuse, the "dark horse" crew, pulled gallantly into third place in the last mile, followed by Pennsylvania, Columbia, California, Wisconsin and Cornell.

POUGHKEEPSIE, N. Y., June 29. (United News)—The crack crew from the University of Washington won the varsity race in the classic Poughkeepsie regatta today by beating out seven shells over the four-mile down stream course on the Hudson river.

The Huskies were barely able to hold off a determined Navy crew, anxious to repeat last year's victory. Washington made a great spurt in the last quarter of a mile to beat the Navy by a scant margin.

Syracuse was third and the others were closely bunched.

It was difficult to distinguish the leader at the half-mile, but as the sweep swimmers reached the mile post Washington was a length in the van. Navy was second, Wisconsin third and Pennsylvania and Cornell tied for fourth. Washington began to gain steadily. Rusty Callow's charges were rowing a beautiful race, responding to every increase in the stroke. At the two-mile mark Washington was leading by two lengths. Navy was second and the other six crews were bunched two lengths behind the Navy. Syracuse pushed forward a little.

The Huskies continued in the lead as the suspension bridge, marking the third mile, was reached. The sun had gone down behind the hills, the last mile of the race to be rowed in shadows.

Navy cut down the lead to a little more than a length under the bridge. Syracuse was third, California fourth, Cornell fifth and Wisconsin, Pennsylvania and Columbia running on even terms.

At the start of the final mile Washington and the Navy were battling it out. Both were rowing a very fast stroke.

The next few teams were so closely bunched that it was at first impossible to determine the order of their finish. Pennsylvania was fourth, with Columbia, California, Wisconsin and Cornell finishing in the order named.

Charlie Root, effective Cub moundman, held the Cards in the palm of his hand as his team-mates were mauling Vic Keen and Johnson. The final score was 11 to 3. The forlorn Phillies rose on their tormentors and walloped the Robins 9 to 4. Four Brooklyn hurlers could not stem the furious Philadelphia attack.

Edwards shut out Siser's Browns, Chicago winning 7 to 0. The White Sox hurler allowed only four hits. Wiltse held Washington to three scattered hits, while the Red Sox made 15, Boston winning 6 to 2. Flagstead got four hits while Stokes got two doubles.

WIMBLEDON, England, June 29. (United News)—Suzanne Lenglen is now definitely out of the Wimbledon tournament and her illness has been announced as neuritis of the right arm, rather than sunstroke, throat trouble, nasal trouble.

"Suzanne" will not play in any more matches here; that's definite," the French star's mother told the United News. "We will remain throughout the tournament and go as spectators if possible, but at present Suzanne's arm is so painful that it hurts even when she is in bed."

Three Frenchmen and one American remain to play the semi-finals and finals of the men's singles. They are Henri Cochet, Jean Borotra, Jacques Brugnon and Howard Kinsey. England went out of it when Cochet beat J. C. Gregory 3-6, 6-4, 6-3, 4-6, 6-3; Kinsey beat P. D. P. Spence of South Africa 6-3, 6-3, 3-6, 6-3; Borotra defeated J. Kozeluh of Czechoslovakia 6-4, 4-6, 9-7, 6-1, and Brugnon beat J. C. Kingsley of England 6-2, 4-6, 6-2, 4-6, 6-4.

Kinsey and Vincent Richards beat S. W. Bobb and R. Meyer 6-4, 6-0, 6-3, but Elizabeth Ryan of California went down before the racket of Mrs. Kitty McKane Godfree in women's singles 1-6, 6-4, 6-0.

KID KAPALAN RETAINS FEATHERWEIGHT TITLE

Receding Waters Reveal Corpses In Leon Flood

LEON, Mex., June 21. (United News)—Receding flood waters of the Gomez river tonight revealed many bodies caught in the muddy debris washed down when the crest of the water swept through.

So far 387 bodies have been recovered and an appalling loss of life is feared. The total number of dead is not, however, expected to reach 1000 or more as was first estimated. A week probably will be required to ascertain the number of deaths and the extent of the damage as a result of one of the worst floods in the history of this region.

Prompt relief measures gradually made themselves felt. Railway communication has been restored and supplies moved into the stricken area to assist those whose homes and places of work were destroyed. Money is being supplied for the emergency.
