system that we have developed," remarked Utley, "we also have a large geyser that spouts continuously from 40 to 60 feet in the air. An electrical engineer from Philadelphia who was recently in Lakeview said we have the greatest heating plant in the world.

Description of Building

With its two long wings and sweeping facade, the building is one of the most entrancing beauty constructed with the utmost care and expert workmanship. While the attendant buildings, some of which are yet to be constructed, the total cost will mount close to \$100,000. No expense has been spared in building or in the class of its appointments to make it the very best.

Testing of the natural hot water heating system has been under way the past week and has proven a distinct success. Hot water is taken from a well driven on the hill east of the buildings, tapping this well at an elevation 30 feet below the surface by means of a tunnel, and then by the use of quieting chambers for the pent-up steam and boiling water it is fed to the buildings through a four-inch pipe. Due to the expansion five loops 12 feet in diameter are laid in the line.

Plenty of Heat

With only a fraction of the available heat being used, tests indicate that the buildings can be heated in the most severe weather. Hot water for domestic use and a well of cold water is run into the buildings from a reservoir also east of the buildings.

Construction of a large natatorium just south of the main buildings has been started with the excavation of the pit which is 50x100 feet. This will be covered with a building 75x150 feet in size carrying two stories on the part surrounding the tank. This will be equipped with locker and dressing rooms and the upper story will be divided into apartments.

The project of which these buildings are a part is one of the most extensive building undertakings of Lakeview of recent years.

Yankee Monument Unveiled Before French Notables

ST. NAZAIRE, France, June 25.

(United Press)—The monument to the first American troops to land in France during the war was unveiled today in the presence of United States Ambassador Myron T. Herrick and General J. J. Pershing. American and French colors were saluted as the monument was unveiled.

Addressing himself to frequent European criticisms of alleged American materialism and selfishness during and since the war Herrick said:

"We took all other people today squarely and frankly in the face, proud of an unblemished record of fair dealings with all nations in the past and calmly determined to pursue this course in the future. "We were hailed throughout Europe a few years ago in the realm of idealism, pioneers in its application to world affairs. We have lately been proclaimed as materialists whose influence in the family of nations rests upon the assumption that we are the greatest present repositories of the world's material powers. The thoughtless accept both versions, the discriminating reserve their judgment. The American's capacity for sacrifice for any cause he holds dear was not suddenly born in 1917. It has been his dominant characteristic for at least 200 years. It is as much alive in our people today as it was when we declared war."

WHITELINE LAND TO BE DEVELOPED

the tremendous undeveloped potential wealth of Klamath county. I feel that my firm was justified in expending such a large sum for property that has remained untouched by the investor for years. "The proximity of other holdings to the Whiteline property assures a speedy increase in their value when the subdivisions have been marked and property thrown open for settlement. The south end of the land offers, in my opinion, some of the finest suburban homesites available in Klamath Falls, and as for the lake frontage its desirability for factory and industrial locations cannot be questioned."

Last Attractive Site

McCullough pointed out that inasmuch as virtually all of the attractive sites on the eastern margin of the lake had already been acquired by other interests, incoming investors in search of practical locations of an industrial nature, would naturally gravitate toward this property, as it offered the utmost in proximity to rail transportation and water frontage.

Of Historical Interest

The property also holds considerable historical interest locally. It was upon this land that Klamath Falls' original location was settled. The original townsite was situated west of the old townsite of Linkville, or what is now known as the city of Klamath Falls, and was called Merganser, so named after a species of duck or waterfowl allied to the duck which was a native of this region.

Mr. McCullough pointed out that the ultimate settlement of the Whiteline tract would be the first development to occur on the western bank of Lake Ewanna, as heretofore sites had all been selected upon the opposite margin because of inadequate transportation facilities.

Rail Development Watched

With the materialization of the rail developments that have already advanced to a concrete stage, this objection will have been overcome and the possibilities of this section can be fully appreciated, Mr. McCullough said.

"Just when the Northwestern Utilities company will inaugurate their program here, I am not in position to announce definitely," said the Northwestern representative, "but Klamath Falls can abide by the assurance that this important step in laying a corner stone for her future commercial foundation is not far off."
