

REDS CAPTURE ALL CONTESTS WITH PIRATES

Cincinnati made a clean sweep of the five-game series with the world's champion Pirates Tuesday by taking the final encounter, 6 to 3.

Three red legs, Pipp, Walker and Emmer, clouted triples which helped down Pittsburgh.

With Babe Ruth knocking out his 26th homer of the season, the Yanks climbed another notch higher in the American league run-away as the Hugmen defeated the Athletics 7 to 5. Herb Pennock held the Mackmen handily, while his slugging team mates pounded the offerings of three moundmen. Jumping Joe Mauer made four hits.

The Giants suffered two defeats at the hands of the Braves, losing 5 to 0 and 7 to 3. The double defeat sent the thundering New Yorkers to sixth place, being supplanted by the Cubs.

The Red Sox made it two straight over Washington, winning 2 to 1. Slim Harris hurled splendid ball, a shade better than Coveleskie. The Indian jumped into third place in the junior circuit by their victory over Chicago, 4 to 2.

Shaute allowed the Chicago batters only seven scattered hits.

The Tigers dropped a peg by losing to St. Louis 11 to 3. The Browns scored in every inning but the fourth.

Brooklyn turned on the Phillies to win 4 to 3 in eleven innings. As a result, Brooklyn is pressing the Pirates for third place.

Dreamland Came As Harmon Fails To Whip Latzo

DREAMLAND PARK, Newark, N. J., June 29.—(United News)—It was dreamland for Willie Harmon Tuesday night, when the New York Italian tried to wrest Pete Latzo's newly acquired title from the welterweight king.

A right hand smash to the jaw in the fifth round, after a terrific body bombardment, knocked out Harmon for the first time in that ambitious veteran's career.

Lato, who weighed 153 pounds to Harmon's 144 bided his time for two rounds, letting Willie pile up a lead. Then he cut loose and quickly took all the steam out of the New Yorker. The knockout blow, a right cross to the jaw, delivered after two minutes and 50 seconds of the fifth round, dropped Harmon flat on his back, where he lay with unseeing eyes until carried to his corner.

He was "out" for more than a minute. The New Yorker, although he was outwitted by nearly nine pounds, carried the fight to Latzo at the start.

He showed more aggressiveness than in recent fights, shooting lefts to the champion's head while the Scranton boy contented himself with piling up points at infighting.

Harmon slipped to the canvas in the first but was up without a count. He was a favorite with the crowd. The champion was booed for using his elbows in the second. He was fat and puffing for breath early in the fight.

Winner of Fight Gets Chance at Francis Charles

NEW YORK, June 29.—(United News)—Within one week after the Paul Berlenbach-Jack Delaney light heavyweight championship fight, the winner will meet Francis Charles, who holds the European title at 175 pounds, according to announcement by Humbert J. Fugazy, promoter.

Charles, accompanied by Andrew Routs, featherweight champion of Europe and other boxers, arrived here Tuesday and signed for the bout. The Frenchman went at once to Mme. Bey's Summit, N. J. camp, to start training.

Berlenbach also is working out for the Delaney fight July 15.

Fugazy apparently, bent upon cornering the light heavyweight market, and leaving the bigger fry to his rival, Tex Rickard, announced that Berlenbach and Delaney both had agreed to meet Charles.

STARKEY HAS SHADE DOTSON 10-ROUND BOUT

Before a yelling crowd of hundreds that packed Scandia hall last night, Kid Starkey and Benny Dotson fought ten slashing rounds to a draw in what the fans were unanimous in acclaiming as the most thrilling battle ever staged here.

Starkey took the aggressive at the opening bell and rushed the fight all the way through, keeping Dotson constantly on the defensive.

Although the local man failed to win by the knockout he had hoped would decide the battle, he gave Dotson a lesson in gloves that will not be soon forgotten.

At the sound of the gong, Starkey leaped at his opponent and landed several effective lefts that made the Portland boy cautious for the rest of the fight. In the second round, Starkey put a right to the head that drew blood. A smashing left to the jaw sent Dotson into the ropes and for a moment it looked like dreamland for Dotson. Dotson came back strong, however, and did some real fighting to save himself.

The remainder of the fight was mostly Starkey's, with Dotson landing occasionally, but having no stopping power on the determined carpenter. Dotson was dazed in the tenth and was fighting doggedly to keep Starkey from landing a knockout punch when the gong sounded.

There was some protest as to the referee's decision, who declared the fight a draw, but the majority seemed to think hitting honors were even.

The semi-wind-up, which was stepped by Jack Crim, substituting for Wilbur Harrington, who was compelled to withdraw because of an injured hand, and Jimmie Harms of Oakland, was a sorry match for the Oakland fighter. Crim hit Harms with about everything he had and then wrestled him around the ring in what was an apparent attempt to persuade him to continue fighting for the full six rounds. Harms was on the verge of a knockout several times and finally wilted in the last minute of fighting in the sixth when a hard right to the body sent him to the canvas for the count.

The four-round preliminary between Sailor Fay, ex-gob from San Francisco, and Buddy Crim, youthful slugger from the reservation, was the most interesting bout on the card with the exception of the main event. Sailor Fay won by a knockout in the second round after sending the young Indian to the canvas twice at the sound of the gong.

The first round of the duel went to Fay by a wide margin.

The battle royal staged by Manager Sylvester as a curtain raiser, put the house in an uproar and was probably enjoyed as much as any of the other fights on the card.
