"You would be surprised to learn of the number of persons who seek information only about fishing grounds in Klamath county. Especially do California visitors seem to be well posted on Klamath's fishing and ask about game fish the first thing," said Mrs. Smith.

RENEWAL OF FIRE CAUSING ANXIETY

The Klamath Forest Protective association, said last night. The fire at a late hour was not as threatening as it had been earlier in the day, and was gradually being brought under submission by the fire fighters. Mr. Kimball said. The danger is not yet over, he warns, and any sudden freshening of the wind may again send the flames leaping through the forests.

The present situation of the fire is in heavily timbered country and another gale like that of yesterday might result in the loss of thousands of acres of valuable pine holdings.

Just what the damage wrought to timber lands in the Aspen lake sector is cannot be accurately determined, as it has been difficult to pierce the burned area on account of the uncertain direction of the fire, Kimball explained, but a rough estimate places the loss so far at from 30 to 40 per cent of the stand.

"This may be gross exaggeration, as there has been no opportunity to make anything like a survey of the burned over area, and less than 10,000 acres in the Aspen lake country may have been burned. Some of the men were of the opinion that the damage would approximate close to 40,000 acres," Kimball said.

"I don't believe it will hardly reach this figure, as the heaviest damage wrought since the outbreak of the fire was during the high wind yesterday and that of last week, but in each case the wind ceased after blowing a few hours and less damage than is feared may have resulted," Kimball said.

WILD HORSES ARE MAKING FERTILIZER

HOOD RIVER, June 29.—Charles B. Frazier, Portland investment man, who passed through here yesterday after a tour of central and eastern Oregon, reported that large herds of wild horses are being rounded up in Grant county and shipped to a Portland fertilizer factory. While Mr. Frazier was at Mitchell he saw a herd of 410 animals that were being driven to Shantiko, where they were placed aboard cars.

"Many of the horses," said Mr. Frazier, "were chunky animals, well fitted for work stock. Some of them bore brands. Indeed, a few of them were broken animals. One mule and a few colts were in the big herd."

Merrill Pioneer Dies Following Long Sickness

Older residents of Klamath Falls and Merrill were shocked last night by the news of the death of Modesto Giacomini, prominent pioneer rancher of Merrill, who passed away at 4:45 o'clock yesterday afternoon. Death followed a lingering illness.

Modesto Giacomini was born in Menzonia, Cantonico, Switzerland January 14, 1869. At the age of 15 he came to the United States and settled in Humboldt county, Calif. While there he married Miss Mamie Dilco at Eureka, that state. In 1906 he came to Merrill, where he had since made his home.

Mr. Giacomini was the father of Mrs. Lester Offield of Klamath Falls and Mrs. Walter Kelly of Oakland, and one son John Giacomini. His wife also survives him. Others who survive include five brothers, R. P. of Ferndale and Charles, Petrolia and Romeo of Fortuna; James of Oakland and two sisters, Mrs. Minnie Canepa of Rome, Italy and Mrs. Rachella Camerza of Menzonia, Switzerland.

Funeral services will be held in Merrill at the Catholic church, the date to be announced later. Interment will be in Klamath Falls Mt. Calvary cemetery.

Santa Barbara Feels Tremors Of Magnitude

SANTA BARBARA, Calif., June 29.—(United News)—While celebrating its marvelous reconstruction from its \$20,000,000 earthquake a year ago today, Santa Barbara was visited by a recurrent earth tremor Tuesday at 3:22 p. m. The tremor was said to be the heaviest felt since the disastrous shocks of a year ago.

First reports stated that the majority of window glass in the city had been shattered. Walls of buildings were cracked in some instances also, it was said.

Three-year-old Billie Orr was the only fatality of the quake. He was playing in the yard when the shock occurred. A chimney, believed weakened a year ago, fell from the Orr home, crashing over the life of the child.

A hurried survey of the damage by police and city officials revealed, according to reports, that the Carrillo hotel and Central building were considerably shaken. Wide cracks were opened in their walls.

Cracks showed plainly in the outer walls of the Granada building. Large plate glass windows in numerous building along State street and less important thoroughfares, were shattered.

Reports indicated that no one was injured.

LOS ANGELES, June 29.—Los Angeles felt an earthquake shock at 3:22 Tuesday afternoon.

NEW YORK, June 29.—Father John W. Tynan, assistant director of seismology at Fordham university, said Tuesday that an earthquake of moderate intensity was registered on the seismograph at the university observatory at 11 o'clock Tuesday morning. According to the record the quake was approximately 3500 miles distant from New York, said Father Tynan.

Great Freighter Is on Fire 1000 Miles in Ocean

SAN FRANCISCO, June 29.—(United News)—Luckenbach Steamship line officials here have received word that fire has broken out in the holds of the freighter Horace Luckenbach, 1090 miles south of San Pedro.

A radiogram from John McNamara, master of the steamer, said that the blaze in number six hold, aft, was still burning, but that he hoped to keep it in check until the ship reached San Pedro.

The vessel is en route from New York to Pacific coast ports.

Heat Wave Grips Central West and Many Prostrated
