

# MIKE M'TIGUE WILL ATTEMPT REAL COMEBACK

NEW YORK, June 30.—(United News)—With Pete Latzo's emphatically successful defense of his new welterweight title, first class boxing becomes a byword in the interim before outdoor fights in July begin with the attempt of old Mike M'Tigue to do a "come back."

The wily Celt, whose eldest grandson took high honors at Dublin university this month, has chosen—or had bounced upon him—none other than J. Risko, the Cleveland rubber boy.

Johnny was said by Tex Rickard to be a coming heavyweight champion. This was after he had landed a lucky left swipe to Paul Berlenbach's jaw. A short time afterwards, Johnny was said to be just one of those inflated bladders the children use in swimming. This was after Young Strubling had made a rubber monkey out of Risko.

Mike and Johnny will box 10 rounds more or less at the Madison Square Garden Thursday night. It is not the world's worst match, with Larry Estridge, Johnny Wilson, George Godfrey and such aggressive young men still in the boxing business, but it is just about the match.

M'Tigue still is complaining because Patsy Haley saved him from complete annihilation at the hands of Jack Delaney early in the spring, and believes he can outpoint Risko and re-establish himself.

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# Fire Fighters Winning Battle In California

SAN FRANCISCO, June 30.—(United News)—Fire fighters are winning their battle against the menacing walls of flame which have burned over several thousands of acres of timber and brush this week.

Hundreds of men, directed by forest rangers, had succeeded late Wednesday night in putting under control all but a score of fires which earlier had numbered into the hundreds. The most serious blaze remaining was in the vicinity of Susanville, Lassen county, where a high wind late in the day whipped up the flames which had been subdued and started the fire roaring over the flat south of the city.

Two large lumber mills and several ranch houses were threatened with destruction.

Fires this week have caused one death and injuries to a score of men battling the outbreaks. Motorists are reported speeding hurriedly out of northern California to avoid being conscripted for duty on the fire lines.

# Tourist Travel To Oregon Caves Shows Increase

GRANTS PASS, June 30.—Tourist travel to the Oregon Caves is increasing, and already there have been three times as many people through the caverns as there were at the same time last season. The official count shows that 673 people have registered for the trip through, not counting Cave-men who were there on May 1. This lacks just three of being three times greater as on the same day in 1925. Sunday 81 people went through.

Improvements are being made at the Caves continually, looking toward added comforts for the visitors. George Sablin, manager, states that present indications are for a greatly increased attendance this year, due to the favorable reports which have gone out and to the advertising which is being carried on extensively in connection with the Redwood highway, as well as by the Oregon Caves Resort company.

# Attorney Says He's Right in Using Dry Cash

WASHINGTON, June 29.—(United News)—Appearing at a night session of the committee investigating the Pennsylvania primary, Attorney George W. Woodruff defended his action in using W. C. T. U. contributions for prohibition enforcement. "If anybody wants to test it out," he said, "the courts of Pennsylvania are open."

Woodruff said the constitution required the executive to enforce the law and that he was free to do this in any way not expressly forbidden.

He admitted a contribution of \$17,600 to Pinchot's senatorial campaign.
