

NEW PRESIDENT U. OF O. MUST ANSWER CHARGE

PORTLAND, June 30.—(United News)—Statements attributed to Dr. Arnold Bennett Hall, president elect of the University of Oregon, in which he is said to have repudiated the eighteenth amendment to the federal constitution have brought forth such a tempest from all corners of the state as this commonwealth has not seen in many a year.

Dry law organizations of Oregon pounced upon the declaration held to have been made at a conference in Iowa City, Ia., and in a series of meetings Wednesday declared that if Dr. Hall had been correctly quoted he was unfit to fill the presidential chair at Eugene.

Portland ministerial association, meeting Wednesday afternoon in the First Christian church, submitted by the Rev. W. H. Nugent, chairman of the Anti-saloon league, demanded that the board of regents of the university investigate reports of Dr. Hall's anti-prohibition attitude.

"It is reported that Dr. Hall, president-elect of the University of Oregon, caustically arraigned the prohibition law," said the resolution, "declaring it to be a scandalous failure as a national undertaking, and declaring himself to be opposed to it in principle as an item in monotonous standardization."

The resolution was roundly applauded. Reacting with indignation to the reports, the executive committee of the Anti-saloon league of Oregon, meeting at noon Wednesday at the Y. M. C. A., adopted resolutions calling on the board of regents to make immediate investigation into the facts of the case.

Going further the resolutions set out that it was not believed by the Anti-saloon league that should Hall have been correctly quoted the people of Oregon would consider him to be a proper person to serve as the head of the state's big institution of higher learning. Various members expressed their open disapproval of the reported attitude of the president-elect and out of the discussion grew the resolution which demanded "investigation of the facts," and the expression of doubt, were Hall to be found to have been correctly quoted, as to his availability for president of the university.

The matter is to be brought before the ministerial association, which also was to meet at the Y. M. C. A. today.

Lumber Trading Above Year Ago States Report

The improvement of lumber continues large when compared with last year and shipments from the principal softwood producing sections for the first 21 weeks of this year have been nearly a third of a billion feet ahead of their production. Despite the consequent reduction in mill stocks, however, quotations have lacked their usual spring buoyancy, and current prices of most species remain unsatisfactory to the mills. The lateness of the spring created a buyers' market, says the American Lumberman of Chicago, and purchasers have so far been able to retain their advance by very conservative purchasing, but appear to be reducing their stocks, those of 250 yards in the southwest as of May 1 being reported 6 per cent less than on the corresponding date last year. When it is remembered that mill stocks are also showing heavy declines it can be seen that the market is working into much stronger statistical position.

Building demand for lumber in many of the most important cities is greatly retarded by union demands for wage increases. But in the smaller towns there is noted much activity, the greater prosperity among farmers in enabling them to begin taking what is more nearly their normal percentage of the lumber output. Prospects for fall trade especially look very good to lumbermen who have made a canvass of the market. But, of greater present importance, the most of them find current demand gaining and say that inquiries indicate the market will not have to wait until fall for decided betterment.

Southern pine is finding its best trade in the southern states. Northern markets have not yet begun to buy heavily, but the eastern states are sending in a greater volume of inquiry. Coast fir is moving best in the rail trade to the middle west, but the California market is taking on activity. Oriental and Australian markets are dull. The Atlantic coast fir trade is showing a better tone for building activity is absorbing the heavy consignments made in the early season.

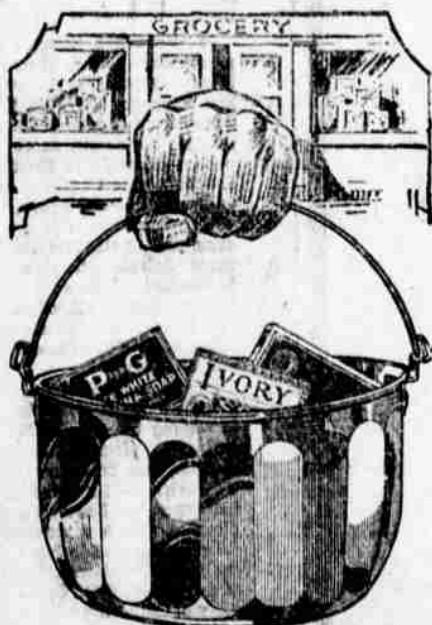
