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SUBURBAN ACRES

Keeping everlastingly at it they say brings success, and we propose pounding away at the idea of suburban development if it takes a jubilee.

Because local lumber mills employ thousands of able bodied men at high wages is no sign that everyone is equipped physically to do their work and earn their money. There are other thousands just as anxious to make good in a business way, and to many of them the broad acres around Klamath clearly point the way.

Take poultry for instance. It is the one industry that can be started with small capital and developed to any extent one cares. It is something women folk can manage while their husbands or sons are busy at something else, and the fine point about it is that Klamath can use quickly all that is raised. The market is here and immediate. Thousands of cases of eggs are brought in from Rogue valley points for no other reason than our own people are too easy-going and indifferent to care. Perhaps if some of them could visualize a steady income of \$2,000 to \$3,000 a year without killing themselves they would get busy on the land. Or shall we proselyte for outsiders to come here and show us how to take advantage of the real appointments that are right at our feet?

BANKING SERVICE

There is no good reason why a bank should keep books for its customers free of charge any more than it should manicure their finger nails.

Service of this sort costs, and even banks have to think once in a while about overhead expense. The tendency in other cities is to debit each account fifty cents or one dollar a month on all balances below a certain figure. That encourages thrift and a tendency to be more careful with the monthly budget.

Klamath banks have been very liberal heretofore, but there is such a thing as overdoing free service. The small account charge would enable them to put on more help, thus relieving somewhat the high strain under which their organization is compelled to work and at the same time enable them to handle expeditiously the large number of people that must of necessity visit the bank during the week end.

Ordinance For Sea Wall Held Strictly Valid

SALEM, June 30.—(United News)—The ordinance of the city of Portland providing for the construction of a \$2,000,000 sea wall intercepting sewer and drainage system along Front street from Jefferson to Glisan streets is held to be valid in a decision handed down by the supreme court today.

The opinion written by Justice Brown affirms the decree of Judge Campbell of Multnomah county circuit court, dismissing the application of the Pioneer Real Estate company for a restraining order against the city of Portland to prevent construction of the proposed improvement.

SALEM, June 30.—(United News)—F. J. Burns, examiner and traffic expert with the Oregon Public Service commission for the past five years, has resigned to become traffic manager for the Oregon Stage Lines, Inc., effective July 1.

GAME MEN FROWN ON DEER AS PETS

PORTLAND, June 30.—Application for permission to keep fawns are being received by the game commission. Three came in Tuesday morning. One of them said the mother of the little animal had been killed.

The commission denies such permits unless the mother has been killed, and fawns on the practice of petting young deer. After a fawn has been petted by people the doe refuses to have anything more to do with it, and, left to shift for itself, it usually dies, according to F. M. Brown, chief deputy game warden. It is hard to rear deer taken very young.

Sixty or seventy fawns were domesticated last year, Brown said. Most of these are does, and by the commission's computation of natural increase of deer this means a material cut in the Oregon game crop.
