

Southern Pacific Makes Changes in Traffic Officials

William Sproule, president, Southern Pacific Company, today made announcement of the following changes in the traffic organization incident to the resignation of T. M. Schumacher, vice-president in charge of traffic with headquarters at Chicago, who has accepted the position of chairman of the executive committee of the Western Pacific railroad and of the Denver and Rio Grande Western Railroad, effective July 1.

"It has been decided by the company to abolish the position of vice-president in charge of traffic and action to that end was taken today in New York by the executive committee.

"The position of traffic manager in Chicago has been created and E. W. Clapp, at this time assistant freight traffic manager at San Francisco, has been appointed thereto. He will represent all of the Southern Pacific lines in the solicitation and development of through traffic and relations with other lines incident thereto. He will be in charge of the company's off-line traffic agencies.

"His principal assistant, with title of freight traffic manager, will be P. H. Plaisted, who is one of the company's experienced officials.

"Under the new organization the traffic manager at Chicago will report to the administrative heads of the Southern Pacific unities.

"Paul Shoup, executive officer Southern Pacific Steamship Lines.

"W. R. Scott, president of Texas and Louisiana Lines, Houston, Tex., H. B. Titcomb, president Southern Pacific Railroad Company of Mexico, Tucson, Arizona.

"The freight and passenger traffic managers resident on these various sections of the system will be co-ordinate as to authority with the traffic manager at Chicago, whose duties will be in connection with off-line activities.

"The other changes incident to the reorganization are:

"In San Francisco, G. W. Luce, who will retire, under the pension rules of the company as to age September next and who is now ill, has been granted leave of absence. J. T. Saunders, at present assistant freight traffic manager at Los Angeles, succeeds him as freight traffic manager. H. A. Hinshaw, assistant freight traffic manager, San Francisco, succeeds Clapp and he in turn in his present duties will be succeeded by H. C. Hallmark, at present general freight agent, San Francisco, Calif.

"In Los Angeles, J. T. Saunders will be succeeded by the present general freight agent in that city, F. E. Scott, G. J. Blech, now assistant general freight agent at San Francisco, will succeed Scott as general freight agent.

"M. A. Cummings, at present assistant general freight agent, San Francisco, becomes general freight agent, succeeding H. C. Hallmark.

"The promotions in the San Francisco office following the elevation of Blech and Cummings to position of general freight agents result in the present assistant general freight agents, H. W. Klein, W. S. Dawson and A. A. Johnson, being advanced in rank, the transfer of J. L. Peeding, present assistant general freight agent at El Paso, to San Francisco with like title, and the advancement of D. J. McGonney of the San Francisco office to the position of assistant general freight agent at San Francisco.

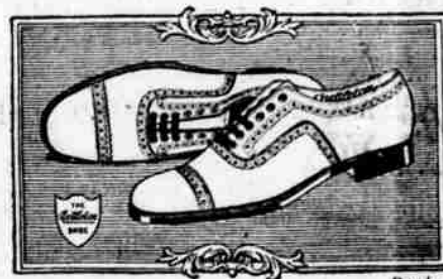
