

PELICAN TEAM LINE-UP WILL SHOW STRENGTH

Manager Rip King Adds Four Stars; One Pitcher, Catcher and Two Outfielders; All Show Class

The Pelicans have been signed for a series of three games with that strong aggregation from Woodland, California, to be played at the Klamath County Fair Grounds July 4, 5 and 6.

Baseball fans are promised something out of the ordinary during the series, and that the Pelicans may give a thorough account of themselves. Manager Rip King has reinforced the team by securing the services of a catcher, a pitcher and two outfielders, and the Woodland boys will have to do some fast stepping when they mix with the local players.

L. C. Hogle, who has been giving a good account of himself up in Washington during the present season, will arrive here today to join the moundsmen of the Pelicans, and they do say he carries a number of fancy twists up his sleeve that cause anxiety to be written over the faces of those facing him from the batting box.

Collins, the new catcher, comes from Arizona where he has been playing with the Copper league. He is said to be equally good at first base, and if he shows up to expectations with the Pelicans in the Woodland game he will be signed up for the remainder of the season.

Hogle, the new twirling star, will be used as relief for Sage and Street and will replace Joe Silva, recently acquired by the Pelicans from Grant's Pass, and who is now slowly mending from a sprained ankle that he suffered while playing in the game with Medford last Sunday. Silva has been released from the Medford hospital, but will not be able to participate in the game with Woodland next Sunday.

Two other additions to the Pelican team are Scott and Jinks, who have been playing with the Oregon Agricultural college at Corvallis during the present season. Both are exceptional strong outfield men, and will strengthen the line-up of the Pelicans most materially. They

MAJOR LEAGUE PENNANT NOW NEARING FINISH FIRST LAP

NEW YORK, July 1.—(United News)—As the major league pennant races enter the month of July within a few days of the halfway mark, dopesters make ready for a second guess.

The New York Yankees, who drew out in front in the American League pennant chase by virtue of two long winning streaks early in the season, have only one more week on the road and then will be home again for the rest of the month.

It was at the local stadium that the Yanks piled up the foundation for their impressive lead which now amounts to 10 full games.

Behind the Yanks five clubs are closely bunched, with only three games separating the White Sox in second place from the Senators in sixth.

From 10 to 13 games to make up from now until September 28 is a task requiring more class than any of the five contenders has shown thus far.

It is too early to despair of the Athletics, but Mack's disappointing youngsters tossed away another ball game this afternoon, four pitchers, including Lefty Groves, Sammy Gray, Joe Tate and Walberg, failing to stop the lowly Red Sox, who won 10 to 5.

Meanwhile the Yanks, home for a day, showed that they would beat even Walter Johnson. Urban Shockley bested the "big train" in the first game of a double-header which the locals won 3 to 2. Then Beall and McQuaid tossed the second game to the Senators before Braxton could get to the rescue of Washington, winning 12 to 5.

Cleveland, Detroit and Chicago, three teams well up in the running, have shown no pennant possibilities. The Sox lost to the Browns today, 4 to 3, and the Indians beat the Tigers 11 to 8. From the vantage point of July 1 it seems that the Athletics must catch the speeding Yanks, if anyone is to do so.
