Members of the Chiloquin Rodeo association, which is composed of all business men of the city, met Wednesday and perfected all plans for handling the tremendous crowds expected during the four days of celebration from July 3rd to 6th. Special measures are being made to care for large crowds who will arrive here for the four days. Camp ground space is being laid out with plenty of cold water, lots of shade, wood and lights.

Chairman J. W. Bartlett and Claude Newman, two local business men who have been placed in charge of the celebration committee report wonderful progress in the rodeo and other attractions.

Already some of the best strings of horses in the west have arrived for the celebration. The famous Big string of horses, which includes a number of real wild ones, some of them having never been ridden before, and others of the real bucking variety; The John Day valley string, the Silver Lake string, and many small bands of thoroughbreds from other parts of the state and from northern California are arriving daily.

Many trick and fancy riders will give fancy and exhibition dances daily. Anita Studnich, well known girl champion fancy rider and bucking horse rider will give daily exhibitions.

Competition promises to be keen for the \$4000 prize money offered by the association for the races, bucking contests and bull dogging contests.
